MESSAGE FROM THE MAYOR: STORMY WEATHER LEADS TO BLUE SKIES

You don't need song titles from the 1940s to tell you that this was a most difficult winter. First we were hit with biggest snowstorm Ardsley has received in many years. Then two hurricane-like later, a Nor'easter attacked Ardslev with a ferocity even Louie Pascone, our 60year of veteran a Highway Foreman, hasn't seen in decades. During the first storm, over 300 residences lost power on Friday and Saturday, February 26th and 27th, as well as most businesses in the downtown area between Ashford and Heatherdell. While we were first told that power wouldn't be restored until Tuesday, most everyone was restored by Sunday.

With the second storm, the businesses lost power again on Friday, March 12th. They were restored the next day, but after 3:00 pm on Saturday, over 500 residences lost power. With 170,000 Con Ed customers without service, the utility was not providing any estimates for restoration. At an 11:00 am countywide conference call on Sunday the 14th, Village Manager George Calvi and I heard that schools without power would be given priority by Con Ed. We spent the rest of the day reminding Con Ed that Concord Road Elementary was powerless.

That strategy worked: Late in the day, a Con Ed truck showed up and that's when our Fire Chiefs took charge. Chiefs Rick Thompson and Vincent Coulehan literally followed the truck from pole to pole down Heatherdell,

instructing the workers, helping with traffic control and cajoling the utility workers not to leave until the job was done. At one point I called Rick to tell him a lone house was still out on Huntley. Rick convinced the truck to double back and restore service to that residence. Thanks to these two tireless workers, almost all of the 536

Ardsley residents without power were restored by Sunday night. This was quite a feat - many powerless homes in neighboring Edgemont, Scarsdale, Hastings and Greenburgh were not restored until the following Friday. We owe a great deal of gratitude to Chiefs Thompson and Coulehan for their tireless work during both storms, along with the entire **Ardsley Fire Dept.** who worked extremely hard assisting residents and businesses in the village. We are extremely lucky to have a team of such dedicated volunteers.

I must also commend the spectacular job that was done by our Highway **Department.** first in clearing 20 inches of snow in the first storm, and then removing dozens of down trees. One cannot say enough about how they came through for the village. Kudos are also extended to the **Police Dept** for their fine work, and to **ASVAC** (ambulance corp), who didn't miss a call despite all of the awful weather. And we have to also thank Con Edison, whose workers restored power to Ardsley under the worst of conditions. Last but not least, I want to thank our Village Manager, George Calvi, for giving up two weekends of his life to assist me in diligently fielding non-stop calls and emails to utility and public officials as well as residents in order to get the power back on as soon as possible.

Despite all of the great work, we are not sitting back on our laurels. Ardsley officials have been caucusing to determine what can be done better the next time. Here's some of the ideas we discussed:

- During both storms, George and I wrote many emails that we sent to the Ardsley chat group and to everyone in my address book. Many residents were kind enough to forward these messages to others not on the distribution list. However, that's not good enough. We are currently in the process of setting up a village email distribution list, which will be used to send outgoing communications to all village residents with email. We urge you to sign up for this service to receive important information from your village government. Look for notices in this newsletter and on our village web site. We would like every village residence with email access to eventually be represented on this list.
- Not everyone uses email. We have discussed the possibility of setting up a phone number with an outgoing message updating residents who call in. I fielded many phone calls, and our Police Desk received hundreds of calls. The outgoing message on a dedicated phone line might provide information for those in non-emergency situations along with relief for the police to focus on other pressing matters.
- Fire Chief Coulehan has emailed officials an emergency plan that was written a few years ago to implement during storm emergencies. This plan will be reviewed, edited and adhered to in the future. We will also be participating with the Town of Greenburgh in a larger emergency plan that will set up protocols for inter-municipal cooperation.
- During these storms we offered to open up municipal buildings for residents without power. Nobody was interested (that I knew of) this time around. However, in the future we need a plan in place for opening up a warming center should another snowstorm knock out power. Temperatures rapidly rose during this past blizzard, but a major snowstorm during the month of January with subzero temperatures will necessitate a

formal plan for finding a place where powerless residents can warm up.

- We need to compile a list of those residents who might require assistance in case of a storm emergency -- those who are disabled and/or infirm. These folks need to be listed, and then we need to check up on them to insure assistance is provided where it's most needed.

Lastly, I'd like to thank our residents, particularly those who lost power, for their patience and stoicism. While everyone worked hard to see those without power were restored quickly, even one day without electricity during the dead of winter is very difficult. I greatly appreciate the community we live in, and the way neighbors helped neighbors during a difficult situation. You should all give yourselves a hand!!

ARDSLEY PLEDGES TO BECOME CLIMATE SMART COMMUNITY

On February 1, 2010 upon the recommendation of the Environmental Advisory Committee, the Board of Trustees unanimously approved a resolution adopting the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation's pledge to become a Climate Smart Community. With this pledge the Village Board has taken a bold step towards acknowledging the potential impact of climate change. By committing to actively work towards the goals outlined by the pledge such as reducing greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions, decreasing demand, encouraging energy renewable energy use, increasing material conservation efforts. promoting climate protection through land use planning, supporting a "green" innovation economy, and planning for adaptation to a changing climate, the Board recognizes the responsibility of municipal governments to take the lead on this important issue.

In addition to the pledge, Ardsley is now a member of the Climate Registry; a nonprofit collaboration among North American states, provinces, territories, and Native Sovereign Nations that sets consistent and transparent standards to calculate, verify, and publicly report greenhouse gas emissions into a single registry. By calculating greenhouse gas emissions the village hopes to reduce its impact on the environment. – Susan Porcino, Chairperson, EAC.

TRASH COLLECTIONS DECLINE

The Village's trash collections being carted to Croton Point continue to decline. The December 2009 and year end 2009 figures came in at 2,378.76 tons for the year which is a drop from 2,480.62 tons for 2008, 3,104.25 tons in 2007, and 3,333.61 tons for 2006. In real dollars at \$25 / ton, our carting fees have dropped from a high of \$83,340.25 to \$59,469.00 four years later.

We'd like to think that our residents have become more environmentally sensitive. On the other hand, one might say that this is symptomatic of our continually deteriorating economy. Who knows? No doubt the truth is somewhere out there in the middle. – George Calvi, Village Manager

LEAF BLOWER PERMIT IS REOUIRED

Applications are available in the Clerk's Office for the use of a leaf blower. Each leaf blower operated on any property in the village must meet EPA Phase 2, 2007 exhaust emission standards and must be operated in accordance with the manufacturer's instructions or specifications.

Fees:

Homeowner/Lessee: \$5.00

Landscaper / Commercial Property

Owner: \$25.00.

The permit shall be valid for the life of the leaf blower. Please remember between the dates of May 15 and September 30 (i) only one leaf blower shall be permitted to be operated at any one time on any one property (ii) leaf blowers shall not be operated on any property in the village for a period of more than 30 minutes per day (iii) leaf blowers shall not be operated before 10AM or after 5PM prevailing time weekdays, weekends and holidays. CARBON MONOXIDE DETECTORS REQUIRED

Residents are reminded that Amanda's Law, passed by the New York State Legislature, went into effect on February 22nd. The new law requires all residences, both new and existing, to have carbon monoxide alarms installed. Existing one and two family residences will be required to have one carbon monoxide alarm installed on the lowest story having a sleeping area. – Larry Tomasso, Building Inspector

NEW YORK STATE BUILDING CODE REQUIRES ROOFING & SIDING PERMITS

The Village is now required to issue permits for all roofing and siding projects, as per the recently revised New York State Building Code.

Please keep this in mind if you are planning to install a new roof or siding on your house because it is the property owner's responsibility to obtain the necessary permits. Since it will take some time before all of the roofing and siding contractors who work in the Village are made aware of this change, please inform your contractor of the need to file for a permit before signing a contract. PARCEL Q ACQUIRED

Parcel Q is an odd shaped plot of land at the terminus of Old Sprain Road, a dead end off Underhill Road. It is owned by the County of Westchester and was declared surplus several years ago. Partially because it straddles the border between the Village of Ardsley and the Town of Greenburgh, and partially because it was difficult at determine its to boundaries, negotiations have dragged on for a few years. I am happy to report that all differences have been resolved with the partition of the property into three lots: Parcel Q-A being offered to the Village, Parcel O-B being offered to the Town of Greenburgh, and Parcel Q-C being sold to an adjacent homeowner. The sales price to the Village is \$1.00.

Long-term plans for the governmentowned portions are for the development of a trailway, when monies becomes available for such things in better economic times, which would be a joint effort between the Town of Greenburgh and the Village of Ardsley.

Many thanks to Mayor Leon, Trustee Nardecchia, and Trustee Levine who worked tirelessly to consummate this transaction, and particularly to Town Historian Frank Jazzo who never lost faith in this project. – George Calvi, Village Manager

STORMWATER 101

Did you know that all rainwater and melted snow in Ardsley flow right into the Saw Mill River and Sprain Brook? That this runoff does not go to a water or sewage treatment plant? Zucchetto's 4th Grade Science classes do! Thanks to the Westchester County MM1/MM2 Stormwater Outreach grant, the 4th graders were treated to educational and fun-filled sessions with the Enviroscape Non-Point Source Water Pollution model. Students learned first-hand how leaking car "fluids" (chocolate syrup), lawn "chemicals" (Kool Aid) and dog "poo" (gelatin/syrup mix) get washed right into waterways by watching them get washed into the model's storm drain. Their enthusiasm was tremendous and they promised to bring this new knowledge home to their families.

The students also learned some ways that they themselves can help improve our water quality. Now that spring has arrived, here are some tips that the students, and you, can follow. First, try using little or no fertilizer on your lawn and just spreading the lawn clippings out to feed your lawn. Use less weed killer, too, and tolerate a little less "manicured" look. Consider planting a native perennial flower garden in place of at least some portion of vour lawn. perennials will thrive year after year with little care. Choose xeriscape varieties that don't require much watering. Following these techniques will result in less runoff volume and less toxic stormwater runoff.

And please don't forget to pick up after your pet and dispose of it in a trash receptacle or flush it at home. Don't throw it in the storm drain – the storm drain is not the sewer! Biodegradable bio-baggies are being provided free-of-charge at Village Hall and the Library for a limited time, courtesy of the Westchester County MM1/MM2 Outreach grant. Thanks for making our water cleaner! – Lorraine Kuhn, Stormwater Assistant

WOOD BURNING STOVE SAFETY

The continuing energy crunch is forcing many in our community to turn to some traditional means of keeping warm. People are returning to the use of wood burning stoves and appliances that use alternatives to oil and gas to keep warm. Unfortunately with this use comes increased risk if not done properly and safely. Drawing on lessons learned from the energy crunch of the late 1970's to the early 1980's the Fire Department would like to make sure that the use of wood burning appliances are done safely and by following the following do's and don'ts tragedy can be avoided:

DO—make sure there is enough clearance between the stove and combustible materials. including floors. walls ceilings. and **DO**—place the on stove a noncombustible, fire resistant base. **DO**—have a mason or other competent person inspect the chimney. DO—burn only dry, well-seasoned wood.

DO—consider opening a window a crack for ventilation.
 DO—dispose of ashes in a closed metal container outside the house.

DON'T—extend the stovepipe through a wall or ceiling unless there is no possible alternative. DON'T-connect a wood stove to a fireplace chimney unless the fireplace sealed been DON'T-connect a wood stove to a chimney serving another appliance burning other fuels. DON'T-start a stove fire with flammable fluids, such as gasoline. **DON'T**—burn trash in a stove; doing so can start a chimney fire. **DON'T**—let a wood fire burn unattended or overnight.

Lastly make sure that you have an operating smoke and carbon monoxide detector in the area where the stove is – not right over the stove! In the event of an emergency please dial 911 – The Fire Department is here to serve us all.

CONSTRUCTION AT LIBRARY COMPLETED

We're finished! The construction is done, shelving in place, furniture arranged - we're ready for your continued business! The process has been a long one – at least it seems that way - but worth every minute and every headache!

Many of you have read in the River towns Enterprise about the recent grants the Library has been awarded. From the very beginning, when we started removing the large rock mound outside the library, we have been awarded to date a total of \$311,075 from the Special Public Library Construction Fund of the State Education Department. The total cost of our construction project amounted to \$1.8 million...none of which was passed on to the Village taxpayers!

While we were under construction the Library continued to remain open and circulated almost under the instructions:
