Lastly, there will be the opportunity to select three State Supreme Court Justices. VILLAGE TAXES DUE 12/31/07

Our Village Treasurer, Marion DeMaio, wishes to remind all property owners that the second installment of the Village taxes is due at the end of the business day on Monday, December 31, 2007. Though other Village offices will be closing early that day for New Year's Eve, the Village Treasurer will remain in her office until 4:00 pm to meet last minute taxpayers.

Payments made in person after December 31, or postmarked January 1, 2008 or later will be assessed a late penalty, a charge that no one can waive for any reason under New York State Real Property law. If you are paying

NEW STATE BUILDING & ENERGY CODE EFFECTIVE JANUARY 1, 2008

Building Inspector Larry Tomasso reports that the NYS Department of State - Codes Division has released the 2007 version of the Uniform Fire Prevention and Building Code. Though the new becomes effective January 1, 2008, there will be a transition period from October 3, 2007 to December 31, 2007, where both the 2003 and 2007 versions will be accepted. All permits issued on or after January 1, 2008 must comply with the 2007 version of the Uniform Code regardless of when the application was originally submitted. Please note there is no transition period for the 2007 version of the Energy Code. It becomes effective on January 1, 2008. Please plan your projects accordingly as Building Department is not permitted to deviate from these effective dates.

STORMWATER PHASE II PROGRAM PROGRESSES BY LEAPS & BOUNDS

Volunteer Stormwater Maven Lorraine Kuhn asks "Is vour backyard stream clean?" The answer may be "yes." Dr. Kuhn and student intern Brian Japinga have tested six sites around the entire perimeter of the Village. There's a fair amount of trash and debris, but the water itself is mostly clear and odor free, pH 7 and testing negative for common pollutants. That's good news for the Sprain Brook and Saw Mill River, our receiving water bodies. Testing will continue until we've checked all 57 of Ardsley's outfalls, then the cycle will begin again as a permanent program.

Part of our Phase II SW Program has involved bringing GIS (geographic information systems) Presently, we are to Ardsley. working with Westchester County IT and the Greenburgh Assessor's Office to upgrade and link our system. TALKING ABOUT GYPSIES AND WEEKEND HOURS

Last month Village Manager George Calvi had the opportunity to attend the International City Manager Conference in Pittsburgh. He reports that the seminar selection was as overwhelming and varied as the course listings in a college catalogue. He focused his time on matters regarding emergency responders, diversity issues, and citizen complaint resolution, and came back with a number of ideas mostly in the software area that he plans to trial test and then possibly make recommendations to the Village Board.

During the program on diversity, Mr. Calvi was particularly

impressed during a presentation by a Slovakian municipal manager (a former foreign exchange student in Yakima Valley, Washington State) who advised that in his municipality they were wrestling with how to handle renewals for licensing, permits, and other documents for the Romany or Gypsies owing to their transient lifestyle which in the Manager's Village mind immediately drew parallels with the current illegal alien driver license issuance controversy in Albany.

The gentleman from Slovakia also shared that his Citv recognizes that many if not most people work Monday through Friday, from 9:00 am to 5:00 pm, and had a need for services beyond those hours. Thus, a few years ago City Hall solicited volunteers to work on Saturdays from 8:00 am to noon in exchange for getting the following Monday off. The program has been well by employees received residents alike. Ardsley is also a bedroom community. Would this concept be successful here as well? Let us know. A SIGN OF THE TIMES

WE NEED YOUR NUMBER

A perennial problem is cropping up once again in our village. Homeowners, new and old, are failing to install proper address numbers in visible locations on their homes. Failing to perform this simple task is more than a minor annoyance for deliverymen. It is a serious problem for emergency responders like police. fire, and ambulance. Our village code states that house numbers must be a minimum of six inches in height, and must be placed in a highly visible area not obscured by shrubs. Placement of numbers on a front door is greatly ill advised because in 9 out emergencies those same numbers will not be visible on open front doors, and vital time could be lost. Avoid becoming a statistic, place your numbers in the right place today. ******

They have been temporarily located at the site of the former Westchester Garage on Saw Mill River Road. The new fire facility will provide much needed space for the Fire Department and the Engine Company. Most of the first floor of the new building is dedicated to space for the fire apparatus and firefighting gear. The apparatus floor, which houses the fire apparatus, is much larger than in the previous building to accommodate today's larger fire trucks and allow room around the trucks to work inside during inclement weather. The first floor will also have offices for the Fire Chiefs and Department Captains. as well as a Dispatch Room and Decontamination Area. second floor will house a Meeting Room and Lounge Area for firefighters as well as office space for the Engine Company officers.

The Engine Company Building Committee has spent many hours

over the course of ten years in planning this building. committee had two companies investigate a renovation of the old building to meet the needs of the Fire Department. lt determined that the existing building could not be properly renovated to serve its purpose and meet building codes. At that time planning began on a new firehouse design that would serve the Fire Department and Village for the next 100 years at a reasonable cost. As the new building approaches completion. members of the Building Committee feel that their objective has been met. The members of the Fire Department are looking forward to moving into their new quarters and would like to thank the Ardsley Village Board for their support in making this long anticipated project a reality.
