RE: Baci in the Square, 471 Ashford Ave

As you know, Christopher Weisman, of Baci in the Square, applied for a permit to convert the vacant space at 471 Ashford Avenue into a pizzeria. The space was originally a portion of the former dry cleaning establishment. Village Board approval is required for this project pursuant to §200200-65A of the Village Code.

Mr. Weismann stated that this would be a "take-out only pizzeria" and that there would be no seating and no food preparation other than baking the pizza. He stated that the prep work would be performed at his Montrose location.

The VB had previously determined that all of the businesses in Addyman Square are "grandfathered" for parking requirements for retail and business office uses so parking is not an issue.

Any approvals should contain the following conditions:

- 1. The applicant must provide plans for the remainder of the build-out showing full compliance with the NYS Building Code.
- 2. The applicant must obtain the required permits prior to commencing construction for the build-out.
- 3. The applicant must obtain a sign permit and BAR approval for all proposed signage.
- 4. The hours of operation and number of employees should be identified/confirmed.
- 5. The business owner or property owner must install a key box (Knox Box) on the building in a location approved by the Ardsley Fire Chief, and the business owner must provide keys to be placed in the key box.
- 6. Employees shall be required to obtain parking permits.
- 7. Any conditions the VB deems appropriate.
- 8. Any conditions the Village Attorney or Village Manager deem appropriate.

Where Heatherdell and Saw Mill River Road meet by the Apple Motor Inn and the Ardsley Diner. There is a traffic light, but no crosswalk to get to the pedestrian walkway to VE Macy Park that exists right there. It just makes sense as well as a safety measure. The only way to cross to get to the pedestrian walkway is much further up the road by Center Street and while there is a crosswalk there with flashing lights many cars ignore it especially in the left lane. I have seen and experienced near accidents. It would be a great addition to have a cross walk and crosswalk lights there at the traffic light over 9A as a part of the Village Downtown revitalization plan.

Also the sidewalks and curbs leading up to the pedestrian Walkway to the park are completely broken in that area leaving it a safety hazard as well for citizens. Many people walk and run to the park for various reasons along this path. We try and walk with our stroller and it is very difficult to navigate and you can easily trip or sprain your ankle from the uneven and broken ground there. I think this repair should be a part of the rehabilitation of the Village Downtown if it isn't already.



As you know, Christopher Weisman, of Baci in the Square, applied for a permit to convert the vacant space at 471 Ashford Avenue into a pizzeria. The space was originally a portion of the former dry cleaning establishment. Village Board approval is required for this project pursuant to §200200-65A of the Village Code.

Mr. Weismann stated that this would be a "take-out only pizzeria" and that there would be no seating and no food preparation other than baking the pizza. He stated that the prep work would be performed at his Montrose location.

The VB had previously determined that all of the businesses in Addyman Square are "grandfathered" for parking requirements for retail and business office uses so parking is not an issue.



Amendment to Village Code Chapter 165

A property formerly known as 55 Ridge Road was subdivided into two lots several years ago. The lots are now known as 12 Shady Road and 14 Shady Road.

The original approval included a gravity extension of the Village's sanitary sewer system to accommodate both lots. However, due to inconsistencies with the old sewer maps and the actual field conditions, it became apparent that a gravity main was not possible. The engineer revised the plans to include a forced main (pumped) sanitary sewer extension. The plans were approved by the Planning Board and sent to the Westchester County Health Department for final approval.

Since the Village Code does not address the construction and maintenance of forced mains, the County is requiring that the code be amended to address this situation. As such, in order for the County to approve the sanitary sewer extension, and ultimately the entire subdivision, the Village must adopt the attached draft local law.

It should be noted that the pumps themselves will be on private property and the maintenance, repair and/or replacement of the pumps and pump chambers shall be the responsibility of each home owner. This provision will be stated on the approved subdivision plans for historical purposes. It should also be noted that the County is not approving septic systems for new construction in the Village, so failure to adopt this code amendment will leave the property owner with two unbuildable lots.

RESOLUTION TO AMEND FEES IN SECTION §A210-3 OF THE CODE OF THE VILLAGE OF ARDSLEY

RESOLVED, that the Village Board of the Village of Ardsley hereby amends the fees enumerated in §A210-3 of the Code of the Village of Ardsley as listed below effective June 1, 2024.

The deleted text is highlighted strikethrough and the proposed text is bold underlined.

§A210-3

F. Chapter 122, Garbage, Rubbish and Refuse.

- (1) Commercial waste disposal, weekly volume:
- (a) For one to five thirty-gallon containers per week: \$55 per month.
- (b) For six to 10 thirty gallon containers per week on average: \$125 per month.
- (c) For 11 to 20 thirty-gallon containers per week on average: \$175 per month.
- (d) For 21 or more thirty gallon containers per week on average: \$250 per month.
 - (e) For dumpsters: \$275.
- (2) Penalties for late payment: \$25 for payment received more than 15 days after it is due and an additional \$25 for every additional 15 days late until payment is received.
- (1) Commercial waste disposal, weekly volume:
- (a) For one to three thirty-gallon containers per week: \$70 per month.

- (b) For four or more thirty-gallon containers per week: \$70 per month plus \$20.00 per container in excess of three containers. A dumpster may be required for more than 5 containers as determined by the Highway Foreman.
- (c) For dumpster up to 2 yards: \$375 per month
- (d) For dumpsters over 2 yards up to 5 yards: \$500 per month

(2) Penalties for late payment:

- (a) Payments are due the last day of the month invoiced, or next business day if the last day falls on a weekend or holiday.
- (b) A \$50.00 late payment fee will be assessed for accounts where the payment is not received by the due date.
- (c) An additional \$50.00 late payment fee will be assessed on the first day of each subsequent month that the account is delinquent.
- H. Chapter 148, Parks and Recreation.
- (2) Park facilities: [Note: This pertains to baseball fields, softball fields, soccer fields, pavilions, gazebos, basketball courts and other amenities at McDowell Park and Louis M. Pascone Memorial Park.]
 - (a) Nonleague reservation of any park facility:
 - [1] Residents: \$\frac{\$25}{\$50} per hour.
 - [2] Nonresidents: \$\frac{\$50}{2}\$ per hour.
- (3) Community Center rental fee:
 - (a) For residents: \$75 \$100 per hour.
 - (b) For nonresidents: \$125 \$150 per hour.
 - (c) For non-profit organizations \$25 per hour.
