§ 180-26Qualifications and limitations upon exemption.

D._The applicant has been certified by the authority having jurisdiction for the incorporated volunteer fire company or fire department as an enrolled member of such incorporated volunteer fire company or fire department for at least five-two years or the applicant has been certified by the authority having jurisdiction for the incorporated volunteer ambulance service as an enrolled member of such incorporated volunteer ambulance service for at least five two years. The application shall be certified by the Chief of the volunteer fire company or fire department or the Captain of the voluntary ambulance service as the case may be.

2023 PROCLAMATION DECLARING THE FIRST FRIDAY IN JUNE TO BE NATIONAL GUN VIOLENCE AWARENESS DAY

This proclamation declares the first Friday in June to be National Gun Violence Awareness Day in the Village of Ardsley to honor and remember all victims and survivors of gun violence and to declare that we as a country must do more to reduce gun violence.

WHEREAS, every day, more than 110 Americans are killed by gun violence, alongside more than 200 who are shot and wounded, and on average there are nearly 16,000 gun homicides every year; and

WHEREAS, Americans are 26 times more likely to die by gun homicide than people in other high-income countries; and

WHEREAS, according to the most recent statistics issued by the CDC in New York State in 2021 there were 1,078 gun deaths per year, with a rate of 5.4 deaths per 100,000 people; and

WHEREAS, gun homicides and assaults are concentrated in cities, with more than half of all firearm related gun deaths in the nation occurring in 127 cities; and

WHEREAS, cities across the nation, including Ardsley, are working to end the senseless violence with evidence-based solutions; and

WHEREAS, protecting public safety in the communities they serve is mayors' highest responsibility; and

WHEREAS, support for the Second Amendment rights of lawabiding citizens goes hand-in-hand with keeping guns away from people with dangerous histories; and

WHEREAS, mayors and law enforcement officers know their communities best, are the most familiar with local criminal activity and how to address it, and are best positioned to understand how to keep their citizens safe; and

WHEREAS, gun violence prevention is more important than ever as the COVID-19 pandemic continues to exacerbate gun violence after more than two years of increased gun sales, increased calls to suicide and domestic violence hotlines, and an increase in city gun violence;

WHEREAS, in January 2013, Hadiya Pendleton was tragically shot and killed at age 15; and on June 2, 2023 to recognize the 25th birthday of Hadiya Pendleton (born: June 2, 1997), people across the United States will recognize National Gun Violence Awareness Day and wear orange in tribute to -

(1) Hadiya Pendleton and other victims of gun violence; and

(2) the loved ones of those victims; and

WHEREAS, the idea was inspired by a group of Hadiya's friends, who asked their classmates to commemorate her life by wearing orange; they chose this color because hunters wear orange to announce themselves to other hunters when out in the woods and orange is a color that symbolizes the value of human life; and

WHEREAS, anyone can join this campaign by pledging to wear orange on June 2nd, the first Friday in June in 2023, to help raise awareness about gun violence; and

WHEREAS, by wearing orange on June 2, 2023 Americans will raise awareness about gun violence and honor the lives of gun violence victims and survivors; and

WHEREAS, we renew our commitment to reduce gun violence and pledge to do all we can to keep firearms out of the wrong hands, and encourage responsible gun ownership to help keep our children safe.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that Mayor Nancy Kaboolian of the Village of Ardsley declares the first Friday in June, June 2, 2023, to be National Gun Violence Awareness Day. I encourage all citizens to support their local communities' efforts to prevent the tragic effects of gun violence and to honor and value human lives. *June 5, 2023*

JUNETEENTH PROCLAMATION

WHEREAS, our country is made up of people from every nation on earth, who are declared equal not only in freedom but also in justice, both of which are essential for a healthy human civilization; and

WHEREAS, our nation was conceived on July 4th, 1776 with the Declaration of Independence, the classic statement being: "We hold these truths to be selfevident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness"; and

WHEREAS, on January 1, 1863, President Abraham Lincoln issued the Emancipation Proclamation, which declared "that all persons held as slaves" within the Confederate states "are, and henceforward shall be free" and "that the Executive government of the United States, including the military and naval authorities thereof, will recognize and maintain the freedom of said persons"; and

WHEREAS, the Emancipation Proclamation had little impact on the Texans due to the minimal number of Union troops to enforce the new Executive Order; and

WHEREAS, on April 9, 1865, almost two years after the Emancipation Proclamation was issued, Robert E. Lee surrendered to Lieutenant General Ulysses S. Grant at Appomattox Court House; and WHEREAS, on June 19, 1865, two years after the Emancipation Proclamation was issued, Union troops led by Major General Gordon Granger arrived at Galveston, Texas, and were finally strong enough to influence and overcome the resistance and deliver the news that the Civil War had ended, and that enslaved Africans were free; and

WHEREAS, upon his arrival in Texas, Major General Granger issued General Order Number 3 which stated "[t]he people of Texas are informed that in accordance with a Proclamation from the Executive of the United States, all slaves are free.

This involves an absolute equality of rights and rights of property between former masters and slaves."; and

WHEREAS, although Juneteenth is thought of as "the end of slavery", emancipation for those enslaved in two Union border states (Delaware and Kentucky), would not come until several months later, on December 18, 1865, when ratification of the Thirteenth Amendment to the Constitution which formerly abolished slavery in the United States was announced; and

WHEREAS, Juneteenth is the oldest nationally celebrated commemoration of the ending of slavery in the United States. On June 19, 1865, Union Major General Gordon Granger rode into Galveston, Texas to announce that the Civil War had ended, and slaves had been freed; and

WHEREAS, Juneteenth is a combination of "June" and "nineteenth," in honor of the day that Major General Gordon Granger announced the abolition of slavery in Texas. The holiday is also known as Freedom Day or Emancipation Day; and

WHEREAS, the vestiges of slavery and racism still permeate throughout New York State, and the United States, and are represented in names of places and monuments; and

WHEREAS, the Black Lives Matter movement challenges us to reexamine our core values as a village, state, and nation, and to ensure freedom, liberation, and justice; and

WHEREAS, it is necessary for our entire Village, State and Country to be aware of the importance of this holiday to our Black neighbors; and

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Nancy Kaboolian, Mayor of the Village of Ardsley, recognize Juneteenth in the Village of Ardsley as a testament to freedom, liberation, and justice, and a day where Black life, Black history, and Black culture is honored and celebrated.

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PARKS & RECREATION MASTER PLAN

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The Weston & Sampson team, on behalf of the Village of Ardsley, has prepared this Parks & Recreation Master Plan to assist the Village in future development and improvements to park and recreation facilities within the Ardsley.

Located in Westchester County within the Town of Greenburgh, the Village of Ardsley is nestled between the upper limits of New York City and White Plains. At only 1.3 square miles in size, the Village contains a mixture of commercial, suburban residential, and recreation areas with easy access to the New York I-87, connecting it to New York City to the south and Upstate New York to the north. The Sprain Brook and Saw Mill River Parkways border the Village on the east and west, respectively, with the Hudson River only a short drive to the west.

In 2017, the Village of Ardsley began the process of developing a Comprehensive Plan to guide development and make recommendations for future improvements in the Village. The Plan establishes a vision for the future and establishes goals for implementation of the plan. The plan was formally adopted by the Village Board of Trustees on February 1st, 2021. Several recommendations or goals were identified within the Comprehensive Plan related to improvements to park and recreation facilities, including:

- Developing additional public gathering spaces (such as Addyman Square) to create social cohesion and benefit mental health within the community.
- Create a downtown park web that interconnects Addyman Square with Bicentennial Park and the five other pocket parks.
- Upgrade, renovate, or replace the Thelma Simmer William Van Dorn Youth & Community Center.
- Build recreational programming around new trail loops.
- Ensure a sufficient annual capital budget for all recreational facilities, amenities, and assets.
- Maintain or restore all parks to a level that is purposely functional and aesthetically pleasing.
- Encourage and support sports/fitness events at existing parks, trails, and facilities.
- Develop an "Ardsley Recreational Trailway" to integrate the Village's recreational facilities, parks, and trail with the regional recreation system.
- Transform existing parks and public spaces into activity nodes that accommodate communitybased events, celebrations, memorials, markets, and other public attractions.
- Incorporate revenue raising opportunities into public spaces where appropriate.
- Undertake a redesign of public spaces to accommodate elements such as circulation, seating, landscaping, lighting, wayfinding, and art to promote community responsibility.

To support these goals and the Comprehensive Plan, the Village of Ardsley has sought to develop this Parks & Recreation Master Plan to assess the current recreation opportunities within the Village and recommend a strategy to achieve these goals over the next several years. The plan establishes a clear direction for policy development, support of Village services, and the prioritization of demands and opportunities. The plan positions Ardsley to build on the community's unique assets while identifying new

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strategic initiatives to improve offerings. This effort has been rooted in an inclusive public engagement process and will seek to incorporate accessibility, cost effective improvements and maintenance, and opportunities to reuse municipal and/or non-municipal sites for recreation.

1.0 INTRODUCTION

1.1 History of Ardsley

Ardsley is one of six incorporated villages within the Town of Greenburgh, along with the villages of Dobbs Ferry, Elmsford, Hastings-on-Hudson, Irvington and Tarrytown.¹ The approximately 1.3 square mile Village of Ardsley was originally inhabited by the Weckqueskecks, a branch of the Mohican tribe of the Algonquin Nation.¹ Ashford Avenue, the main road, was once a trail used by Native Americans to travel from the Hudson River to Long Island Sound. By the late 1600's, after the Native Americans had been pushed out of the area by the English and the Dutch, the land became part of the vast Frederick Philipse Manor. During the American Revolution, Philipse remained loyal to the King, and was forced to flee. The land, confiscated by the State, was sold mostly to former tenants who had supported the patriot cause.¹

The re-allocated village, then affectionately known as Ashford, grew slowly. There was a sawmill and grist mill on the Sawmill River, a blacksmith shop, and by the time of the Civil War, three pickle factories. In the early 1880's the Putnam Railroad was built, and the New Croton Aqueduct was constructed, resulting in a development "boom".¹ Parcels of land were sold and developed, electric lights were installed, and roads were improved during this time. In 1883, since an Ashford Post Office already existing in the State, the Village name was changed to Ardsley and on March 2, 1883 the first Postmaster was appointed.1 The Village was incorporated in 1896. By 1898 the population had grown to 372.1

On December 6, 1914, a large fire devastated the center of the Village. As a result, the original schoolhouse on Ashford Avenue was taken over for Village offices and the fire department - now the Municipal Building.¹

After World War I, and until the depression, there was another "boom" including Ardsley Acres and Beacon Hill. After World War II, with the rise of the Baby Boom Generation, the growing population resulted in the construction of the Concord Road Elementary School in 1952, the High School in 1958, and the Middle School in 1967.¹

From a Native American hunting ground to a community of scattered farms, to "Ashford" and a country village, Ardsley has become a thriving suburban community.¹

1.2 Ardsley Planning and Recreation Commission Overview

The Village of Ardsley Comprehensive Plan, updated in 2022, is a dynamic document that revisits and cements Ardsley's 5 tenets which reflects the hopes and expectations of the people of Ardsley, with specific objectives and recommendations about how to guide growth so as to preserve important environmental and historic resources and improve the quality of life of the residents, workers, and visitors in the community. "The plan reflects best practices from the American Planning Association, as well as goals, objectives, and actions proposed in two ancillary Village studies, the Saw Mill River Revitalization Plan and the Market Analysis & Development Strategy."¹

1.3 Mission and Goals

The missions of the Planning Board and Recreation Committee is described below:

"The Planning board shall ensure there is compatible land use within the village of Ardsley. The board reviews and analyzes proposed development and site plan of

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property. Among other items, the board grants approvals to build, excavate, and connect into the sewer lines. Fundamentally the Planning board informs the Zoning Board and the Board of Trustees about future and past municipal happenings and procedures."¹

"The Recreation Commission advises the Board of Trustees on matters related to the regulation and control of Village parks and recreational facilities (including the community center) and assists with developing recreational programming and activities."¹

"The Village of Ardsley's Plan sets out a vision and framework to enhance the Village's residential character by improving connectivity, continuing the delivery of excellent municipal services, and positioning the Village's Central Business District as an active and economically vibrant hub of Village life, while protecting and prudently managing the Village's natural resources in a resilient and sustainable manner." ¹

The Vision hinges on 5 main tenets:

- 1. Provide
- 2. Strengthen
- 3. Connect
- Build
 Protect

1.4 Related Planning Efforts and Integration

The Village of Ardsley has undertaken several planning efforts in recent years that have helped direct the planning process for this plan. These documents include:

- The Saw Mill River Revitalization Plan (SMRRP) (2019)
- Village of Ardsley Comprehensive Plan (1964, Rev. 2022)

1.5 Methodology of this Planning Process

The Project team, including Village staff, and Recreation commission guided this project by providing input to a consulting team throughout the planning process. This collaborative effort creates a plan that fully utilizes the consultant's expertise and incorporates local knowledge and institutional history only the Village staff and community members can provide. The project consisted of the following tasks:

Document existing conditions of facilities & programs in the City.

- Prepare a Community Recreation Needs Assessment.
- Prepare a Community Facilities and Program Report.

1.5.1 Existing Conditions of Community Facilities & Programs

• Identification of all current recreation programs, activities, and community services provided through the Recreation Department.

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• Identification and assessment of existing parks and recreation facilities operated by the Village of Ardsley.

1.5.2 Community Recreation Needs Assessment

- Research and document current gaps and future needs about recreational and community facilities, activities, and recreational programs.
- Solicit quality public input from stakeholder groups, community organizations, residents, businesses, and other interested agencies, such as the Ardsley School District.
- Assess feedback received from the Village and public to determine and practice needs.

1.5.3 Community Facilities and Programs Report

- Prioritize inventory of improved or new facilities, programs, and services as identified through the assessment process.
- Detailed opportunities for matching identified facility, program, and service needs with existing/ available resources.
- Assess staffing levels required to implement inventoried needs.
- Recommend strategies for implementing identified priorities in the short-term and longer-term with consideration of affordability and sustainability, including the potential use of piloting for new programs/ services to gauge public use or testing use of other publicly available facilities.

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2.0 DEMOGRAPHIC PROFILE OF ARDSLEY

2.1 Village of Ardsley Recreation and Park Demographic Profile

The Village of Ardsley demographic profile was developed to provide an analysis of household and economic data in the area, helping to understand the historical and projected changes that may impact the community. The demographics analysis provides insight into the potential market for the community's parks, trails, and recreation programs and services by highlighting where and how the community will change.

Data referenced throughout this report was primarily sourced from Esri Business Analyst as of October 2022. According to their website, Esri Business Analyst is "a solution that applies Geographic Information Systems (GIS) to extensive demographic, consumer spending, and business data to deliver

on-demand analysis." At the time of this report, Esri's primary source for demographic information is the 2020 Census with 2022 estimates.

Finally, information about health, wellness, and disability status were sourced from the American Community Survey and the Robert Wood Johnson Community Health Foundation.

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
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

2.2 Population

From a population of 4,260 in 2000, the Village has continued to grow steadily over the past two decades. In 2022, the population in the Village was estimated at 5,073. Esri projected that the Village would decrease to over 4,957 in 2027.

Population was estimated at 5,073 in 2022.





2.3 Household Information

Analyzing the household characteristics within the Village of Ardsley indicates that the area has a higher median income and a higher average home value than the State of New York. The following information demonstrate the key highlights regarding household information compared to the state:

- The median household income was \$196,677, \$100,000 more than the State of New York \$79,320 (Esri, 2022).
- The average home value was \$767,223, more than the average home value in the State of New York (\$536,142) (Esri, 2022).
- Over 1.79% in the Village of Ardsley were below the poverty level in 2020, compared to 13.54% in the State of New York (Esri, 2020)
- The average household size in the Village of Ardsley (3.05) was very similar to the State of New York (2.53).

2.4 Age

The median age in the Village of Ardsley was 49 years old in 2022, reflective of the age distribution in the area. Over 50% of the population is identified as an adult or active adult in the Village of Ardsley. Almost 25% of the population is considered youth. Significantly older than the State of New York (39.6)

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and the United States (38.9) (Esri, 2021), the median age has been increasing overtime, from 45.2 in 2010 to an anticipated 48.5 in 2027.





Figure 2.3: Age Distribution Characteristics in Village of Ardsley



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Figure 2.5: Age Distribution Characteristics in Village of Ardsley (2010 to 2027)



2.5 Race & Diversity

The Village is increasingly becoming more diverse over time. While still majority White/Caucasian, those of Hispanic origin (irrespective of race) increased from 11.32% of Hispanic origin in 2010 to 16.95% anticipated in 2027.

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


Figure 2.7: Hispanic Origin Change in the Village of Ardsley

2.6 People with Disabilities

According to the American Community Survey, 21.87% of Village of Ardsley's population experienced living with some sort of hearing difficulty, vision difficulty, cognitive difficulty, ambulatory difficulty, self-care difficulty, and/or independent living difficulty. This is lower than the State of New York at 23.95% but still reaffirms the importance of inclusive programming and ADA transition plans for parks and facilities.

2.7 Health and Wellness

Understanding the status of a community's health can help inform policies related to recreation and fitness. Robert Wood Johnson Foundation's County Health Rankings and Roadmaps provided annual insight on the general health of national, state, and county populations. Westchester County, home to the Village of Ardsley, ranked in the highest range of counties in New York (Highest 75-100%). Figure X below provides additional information regarding the County's health data as it may relate to parks, recreation, and community services (Robert Wood Johnson Foundation, 2022).

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3.0 EXISTING PROGRAM INVENTORY & ANALYSIS

The recreation programs analysis reviews the Village of Ardsley Parks and Recreation programs and services offerings through a series of individual analyses. The Weston & Sampson team reviewed the results of these analyses from a global perspective. This recreation analysis report aims to do the following:

- Offers detailed insight into the Village's recreation program offerings
- Helps to identify the strengths, weaknesses, and opportunities for future program direction
- Assist with identifying program categories, programming gaps, and future program considerations.

The report and data that informed the recreation programs analysis process included the Village's participation data, revenue and expenses, and program metric worksheets completed by staff. An internal interview took place that provided information and provided insight. A trends analysis was prepared to inform and drive program services recommendations. The full Trends Analysis Report can be found in Appendix A.

3.1 Program Menu

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The program menu consists of recreational activities offered for a specific time frame. The fiscal year (FY) 2021 and 2022 program menu contains full data sets for one year of programs not impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic and was, therefore, used for the program menu analysis. This section will review the menu's core program areas, service format, program inventory, program distribution, and age segmentation.

3.1.1 Core Program Areas

Youth recreation programs serving participants ages 5-17 and include arts and crafts, sports, fitness/wellness, robotics, and outdoor recreation opportunities. The Village's goals are to engage the community by providing low-fee programs/activities and provide experiences that create lasting memories.

Special events are typically one-day opportunities to recreate-frequently due to a holiday, a specific celebration, a competition, and/or a themed activity. Examples of special events include Food Truck Friday, 5k Races, Easter Egg Hunt, Trunk or Treat, and Ice Cream Socials. The Village's goals are to increase event offerings while achieving full cost recovery.

Senior programs encompass all programs that serve participants ages 55+ and include arts and crafts, field trips, health/wellness, and special events. Seniors enjoy bingo, flower making, onsite flu and COVID shots, Christmas parties and jewelry making. The Villages goals are to provide senior adults with social opportunities to engage with peers that will enhance quality of life and physical, mental, and social wellness.

Adult recreation programs serve participants ages 18 – 54 and include sports leagues, fitness/wellness, and outdoor recreation opportunities. The Village's goals are to engage the community by providing low-fee programs/activities and provide experiences that create lasting memories.

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In regard to fitness activities, walking for exercise was the most popular, with 40% adult participation – higher than the state and national averages. Swimming followed next, with over 20% of adult participation. Finally, jogging and running, followed by weight-lifting, were also popular activities.

3.1.2 Other Services

The Village offers recreation services primarily through drop-in activities, enrollment-based programs and self-service leisure pursuits including facility rentals. Enrollment based activities (activities held on scheduled days and times that require pre-registration) are offered in a seasonal program menu. Programs are offered as both one-time and recurring formats (adult softball and coding/video game design). The Village offers a great balance of free and fee-based programs and special events, but the village does not have an active scholarship program for participants who may have financial hardships.


3.1.3 Program Inventory

The following table is a summary of major program categories that park and recreation agencies throughout the country commonly provide. This list helps identify common program areas not offered by an agency. In matching the Village's inventory of programs against this list, which includes most of the program areas, 43% of these items are represented.

For comparison purposes, the consulting team reviewed the program category percentages against its database of park and recreation agencies nationwide. The comparison agencies' average percentage of program categories was 64.5%, which is higher than the Village's 43% (±52% including alternative providers).




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3.1.4 Program Distribution


Understanding how the Village's enrollment-based program menu is distributed across the core program areas helps identify the extent of programming within each program area in relation to the whole. Figure 1 depicts the total of programs offered in FY2021 and FY2022 by program area and season.

Senior programs scheduled the largest quantity of programs (28) between 2020 – 2021 and 2021 – 2022. Special events (26) followed by youth recreation programs (24) were the second and third largest quantity of programs scheduled during that same time frame. Adult recreation programs (10) provided the least number of programs scheduled during that time. The distribution of the core program area percentages in relation to Figure 3.2 is depicted in Figure 3.3.

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3.1.5 Age Segmentation

The age segment analysis reviews the distribution of program offerings by age segment serviced. For this assessment, age categories were delineated according to the following age structure:

- Youth: ages 6 –17
- Adults: ages 18 54
- Seniors: ages 55+

The number of registration-based program opportunities geared toward age groups were tallied for two fiscal years. If a program section spanned clearly across two age categories (e.g., movie night), it was counted in both categories. Figure 3.4 displays the Village's FY2021, and FY2022 program menus percentage of registration-based programs offered according to each age segment.

Figure 3.4: Age Segmentation of Enrollment-Based Programs Offered, FY2021 and FY2022




The Village offered 176 programs in FY2021 and FY2022, with a large portion (45.2%) designed for senior's participants 55+ years of age. Seniors were followed by youth (30.6%) and adults (24.2%) respectively, it is recommended that the Village began tracking teenagers (ages 13-17) separately from youth (ages 6 - 12). Nationally, parks and recreation agencies separate these age groups as general interest and program designing requires different objectives.

The age segmentation analysis is one helpful method to review the Village's programmingrelated community demographics. Demographic data can be helpful to consider how programming efforts are aligned with the makeup of the community. The adjacent comparison of the community's population and enrollment-based program offerings in Figure 3.5 demonstrates two key age segments' relationship between the population percentage and percentage of programs offered.

The program menu's age segmentation does not need to exactly mirror the community's age demographics segmentation and the Village has great balance within this menu and reflects the demographic makeup of its community.

3.1.6 Current Services

It is important to mention that the Village's current program offerings has maintained its volume through the COVID-19 pandemic which is unusual around the country. The Village has a very impressive program portfolio of programs and activities with one full time employee on staff.

3.2 Program Preference

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In addition to assessing the menu of programs offered, it is helpful to assess program performance. The extent of program performance can be measured by participation, financial performance, and the life cycle analysis.


3.2.1 Enrollment

Total enrollment into the Village's programs was 6908 duplicated participants in FY2021 and FY2022. Special events garnered the highest enrollment with 5432 participants followed by youth recreation programs with 704 duplicated participants, senior and adult programs followed 560 and 212 duplicated participants respectively. Figure 3.6 provides a chart of enrollment by core program areas.

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Special events accounted for 79% of enrollment-based participation in FY2021 and FY2022. Compared to most park and recreation agencies nationwide, it is not rare to have high participation in special events programming.

3.2.2 Cancellation Rates

The difference between the number of courses offered and the number of courses held results in the cancellation rate. A higher rate will generally indicate one of two things:

- The programming team has been charged with trying new programs that have not been ٠ successful yet.
- The programs being offered simply are not meeting the needs of the community.

The first scenario requires patience and perseverance to allow time for exploration and to push communication efforts. The second scenario requires research to understand what factors contributed to program cancellations (e.g., instructor performance, inconsistent instructors, child aged out, or other barriers such as time, day, or transportation). Typically, the target range of a desirable cancellation rate is between 10% and 20%, with 12% - 15% being most ideal.


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Anything higher than 20% indicates staff are doing significant work preparing for and marketing courses that do not run.

The Village's cancellation rate was significantly lower than the national average for fiscal years FY2021 and FY2022. Cancellation rate percentages of programs offered vs. held was 8% in FY2021 and 6% in FY2022, the Department's staff has displayed remarkable vision in its ability to continue offering programs that are intriguing to the community. This also raises the question of a desired need for expanding programs and offerings to the community. Figure 3.8 depicts the number of programs offered compared to the number of programs held (cancellation rate) between FY2021 and FY2022.

3.2.3 Scholarship Program

The Village has not implemented a scholarship program that provides financial aid for eligible youth and adult participants to ensure that equitable participation is available. This is not a concern as less than 2% of the Village's 5000 population are below the poverty level. Also less than half of Village programs and services require fees.

3.2.4 Life Cycle Analysis


The recreation program assessment includes a life cycle analysis of programs selected for review. This type of assessment helps determine if Village staff need to develop new or more creative programs, reposition declining programs, or continue with the current balance of life cycle stages. This assessment is based on staff members' opinions of how their core programs were categorized according to four life cycle stages:

- 1. Introduction
- 3. Mature

2. Growth

4. Decline

Figure 3.9 outlines the description of those life cycle stages and the Village's percentage of programs within each stage.

A healthy balance between life cycle stages is optimal, with most programs in the growth and mature stages. That is the case for the Village: 86% of its programs are in the growth and mature stages. Although the Village does not have issues with success in program offerings, it does experience challenges with capacity and staffing levels, as the demand is higher than the current portfolio. Due to a lack of workforce, the Village struggles with adding and introducing new programs to the public.

As a normal part of the planning cycle, there should be programs in the introduction stage that bring new programs to the menu. There will typically also be programs in the decline stage; those programs should be either repositioned or decommissioned. The Village's percentage of programs in the decline stage (8%) is modest in comparison to national averages. Additionally, efforts to encourage the introduction of new programs - and shift the introduction programs into growth status - would create a more balanced menu. The only way to accomplish this is to increase staffing and resources.

3.3 Trends

The following information details park and recreation industry trends, grouped according to the following categories:

- Adult sports and youth sports
- Age group

These trend categories were selected due to alignment with program desires to the community and Village's offerings. An awareness of current trends helps recreation agencies stay abreast of possible ways to refresh, expand, and/or shift their program menus to stay relevant and interesting.

The following seven trend areas are specific to youth sports because they encompass participation patterns, desires of participants, and strategic direction.

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3.3.1 Traditional Sport Programming

Participation in more traditional sports (e.g., basketball, football, and soccer) has been trending downward across the country over the past several years. Baseball participation has also experienced a decline, but there is currently slight upward movement. However, travel teams for these sports were strong prior to COVID-19. It is estimated that many private travel sports clubs will fold following the pandemic, putting pressure on municipal recreation programs to fill the gaps. Additionally, the National Recreation and Parks Association offers a free toolkit to raise awareness about the benefits of youth sports and to encourage youth sports participation.

3.3.2 Life Sports

According to the Learning Resource Network's "Top Trends in Recreation Programming, Marketing and Management" article, life sports are a new priority in the recreation world. Here, the focus is on developing youth interests in activities they can enjoy for a lifetime, such as biking, kayaking, tennis, golf, swimming, and jogging/walking.

3.3.3 Project Play

The *Aspen Institute* is the coordinating body for an initiative designed to increase youth sport participation rates. Member organizations started developing goals in 2017 that would strategically tackle the problem of getting and keeping kids active. The *Aspen Institute* tools are typically free, and as more tools continue to develop, they will be a tremendous resource to youth sport providers nationwide.

3.3.4 Parkour

Parkour is a physical training discipline that challenges the participant to move their body through obstacle courses—very much like military training. Using movements such as running, jumping, and swinging, the participant moves through static indoor courses or outdoor urban environments. Some agencies are adding parkour-type playgrounds in parks to attract teens.

3.3.5 Disc Golf

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Since 2020, disc golf participation has increased with the addition of courses around the country. For decades, disc golf was regarded as a hobby for college kids and young adults. It has matured over time, and its growth over the last five years proves it. This is likely due to its ability to be played outdoors, socially distanced if necessary, and promote multigenerational competition. Parks and recreation agencies around the country are prioritizing the addition of courses.

3.3.6 Outdoor Active Recreation

Outdoor active recreation includes activities such as kayaking, canoeing, stand-up paddle boarding, mountain biking, and climbing. Rentals for those who want to "try before they buy" are popular in many areas. All these types of activities have experienced an increase since the start of the COVID-19 pandemic.

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3.3.7 Specialty Audiences

Decades ago, recreation agencies focused on offering an entire set of programs for a general audience. Since that time, market segments have been developed, such as programming specifically for seniors. Recently, more market segments have been developed for specialty audiences, such as the LGBTQ+ community, retirees, military veterans, cancer patients, people needing mental health support, and individuals with visible and invisible disabilities. Sports opportunities specific to these groups' needs can provide comfort and increased camaraderie.

3.3.8 Programming Trends by Age Group

Trends for Youth 13 and Under

- STEM and STEAM Programs, which include arts programming, is another area of growing popularity. Some examples include learning to code, designing video games, Minecraft, creating with Roblox, engineering robots, printing 3D characters, and building laptops.
- There is an international movement to connect children, families, and communities to the natural world. The New Nature Movement is having an impact on organic interactions with nature and providing health benefits. Examples of physical amenities designed to connect with nature include installing fitness playgrounds such as *Seaside Wildlife Nature Park* in Staten Island, NY.
- The organization *Reimagine Play* developed a list of the top trends for youth fitness. The sources for its trend information comes from the American College of Sports Medicine's (ACSM's) Worldwide Survey of Fitness Trends, ACE Fitness, and SHAPE America. The top trends include:
 - Physical education classes moving from sports activities to physical literacy curriculums that include teaching fundamentals in movement skills and healthy eating.
 - High-intensity interval training classes
 - Wearable technology and digital fitness media
 - Ninja Warrior training and gyms
 - o Outdoor recreational activities
 - Family fitness classes
 - o Children's obstacle course races
 - Youth running clubs

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Trends for Teens/Younger Adults Ages 13-24 Years

• Esports is a form of competition using video games. Forbes reported in December 2021 that esports audiences exceed 443 million people across the world, and the International Olympic Committee is considering it as a new Olympic sport. Local recreation offerings can include training classes, open play, tournaments, and major competition viewing. A



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new recreation center in Westville, Ohio, includes a dedicated esports room, and college campuses across the country are launching esports programs. SUNY Canton is the first Division 1 school in New York to launch a varsity esports program.

- Park and recreation's role in maintaining a holistic lifestyle will continue to grow. Opportunities to practice mindfulness, authentic living, and disconnection from electronic media are being sought out. Programs to support mental health, including those that help to combat anxiety, perfectionism, and substance abuse in youth and young adults are increasingly needed.
- Fun fitness is a current trend. Exercises like P90X, the Insanity workout, or CrossFit have proven that a lot of equipment is not required to get fit. Because these programs have become popular, newer versions have become available, with some cutting the time in half to look and feel fit. These types of classes have and will continue to grow in popularity at recreation Villages and fitness centers.
- Futsal is a fast-paced small-sided soccer game that is played across the world and is
 officially recognized by both FIFA and UEFA. Futsal earned the status of FIFA's official
 form of indoor soccer in the 1980s, it is a 5 v 5 scaled down version of outdoor soccer
 played on a hard surfaced, basketball sized court with a small low bounced ball. It is
 incredibly popular in the United States with youth and adults and traditionally a great
 asset for the Hispanic/Latino communities, it can be a great contributor to equitable
 distribution of services (DEI).
- Group cycling continues in popularity as younger fitness enthusiasts embrace this highperformance group exercise activity. It also has program variations to attract the beginner participant for development. Despite its continued popularity, group cycling is not projected to grow much beyond current participation numbers.
- Yoga across all forms and participants has grown in popularity. Yoga allows a variety of audiences to participate (e.g., babies, goats, and even dogs) and helps alleviate ailment (e.g., stress and arthritis), which has positioned this activity into a significant growth opportunity.
- Many agencies around the country have added fitness equipment in parks. In Mecklenburg County, North Carolina, outdoor exercise sites are called "Fit Zones." To place the equipment in the most ideal locations, researchers looked at neighborhood health disparities. Utilizing numerous data points (e.g., obesity rates in surrounding area, income, population density around the park, diabetes rates, mortality rates) and geographic information system (GIS) mapping, this data was overlaid with parks.
- Cornhole (also known as bag toss, bag-o, or bags) is a low-impact, low-cost activity that can be played by people of all ages. Young adults are signing up for leagues that can be held indoors or outdoors and offered all year long. It is a social activity that does not take much skill to participate. Although it can be offered recreationally, competitive leagues are offered as well and are growing in parks and recreation settings.

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Trends for Adults Ages 55 and Over

- A Pew Research Center survey found 73% of adults consider themselves lifelong learners. Do-it-yourself project classes and programs that focus on becoming a more well-rounded person are popular. Phrases like "how to" can be added to the agency website's search engine optimization as consumers now turn to the internet as their first source of information for how-to projects.
- Programs such as yoga, Pilates, tai chi, balance training, chair exercises, water fitness, and others continue to be popular with older generations.
- Participants are looking for more day trips that highlight unique local experiences or historical themes. For example, a focus on authentic food, guided night walks, bike tours, concentration on a specific artist's work.
- Improv classes are specifically targeting the active adult group with classes such as "Humor Doesn't Retire." Workshops and groups help seniors play, laugh, and let loose while practicing mental stimulation, memory development, and flexibility.
- Pickleball is a recreational trend that stands alone. What seemed to be a niche activity
 for active older adults has exploded over the past five years. Nationally, agencies are
 prioritizing the addition of courts due to public demands, and this has led to nuisance
 complaints from nearby neighbors about the sound of the ball hitting the paddle. After
 public meetings around the country of how to resolve this issue, it is not recommended
 to build soundproof walls around courts and restrict early morning and late evening play.

3.4 Program Implementation Support

Two factors that contribute to successful program implementation are access to physical spaces to hold programs and the existence of a solid internal operational support structure. Physical spaces include those that the Village owns and manages, such as recreation facilities, partner facilities, and school buildings. Internal operational support structures include a variety of staff functions (e.g., administrative, recreation programming, HR, marketing, IT), equipment and tools, and policies and procedures. Currently, the Village only has the Thelma Zimmer-William Van Dorn Youth & Community Center to offer indoor recreation opportunities. This heavily restricts accessibility and program offerings by approximately 60% coupled with staffing constraints and program catalog.

3.4.1 Business Functions

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Engagement of staff identified a lack of resources as a significant barrier to participation and offerings. The Village has one full time staff managing all parks and recreation operations and programming, this is not suitable for its population and facility portfolio. The current website could use upgrading and the Village has minimal presence on social media. Additional support staff could provide more robust programs, customer service, engagement, and participation.

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3.4.2 Program Menu Direction

One way to help with the Village's ability to make informed decisions about its program menu is to maintain a database of its program offerings outside of registration software. The database should contain information such as:

- Core program area
- Roles
- Delivery model
- Pricing model

- Age segment
- Skill level
- Location

The first step is to maintain the database with accurate information. This can be done on a quarterly or annually. A matrix format can be used, with each program listed in the left column and each information category listed in the first row. A template matrix has been provided to the Village staff for future use. Once filled in, staff can run a series of analyses that will help inform the next program menu's decision-making. It can also help the Village establish annual goals and report out successes. For example, suppose hypothetically that the data shows 60% of programs were offered at the intermediate skill level. Staff might look at that percentage, realize their menu should be better aligned to their mission, and like to shift to providing most of the programming at the beginner skill level. The resulting goal could be to increase the number of beginner-level programs. Similarly, if the data demonstrates geographic inequities, staff can adjust program locations in future program offerings. With the planning matrix data, staff can make more informed, defensible decisions intentionally rooted in equity.

The Weston & Sampson team started exploring some of the information categories with Village staff, encouraging them to first determine what their current roles, delivery model, and pricing models are, and then determine where they want them to be. The current Village roles (for each type of program) could be partner, provider, facilitator, or resource. The delivery model could be self-directed, or leader directed. The pricing model could be free, recover costs, or "pay as able." These three information categories will take time for staff to consider; the others, age segment, skill level, and location, are less philosophical. As a part of the analysis, Village staff started to seriously consider the notion of offering more "pay as able" leisure opportunities. The next steps will be to continue these conversations throughout the next several years of program menu planning sessions—using the data to guide future menu development.

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4.0 EXISTING FACILITY INVENTORY

The Village of Ardsley operates nine park and recreation facilities within the Village. In addition, there are over a several other facilities owned and operated by a variety of public and private groups, such as Westchester County, House of Sports, and non-profit organizations. The park system serves approximately 5,000 Village residents and visitors.

The Village of Ardsley park system consists two large regional parks (larger park areas with multiple recreation facilities; Louis Pascone Memorial Park (Pascone Park) and McDowell Park), six pocket parks (small park areas with limited recreation facilities; American Legion Park, Bicentennial Park, Firefighter's Park, Floyd Lichtenberg Park, Pocost Park, and Silliman Park), and one community center (building housing recreation programs and facilities; Thelma Zimmer – William Van Dorn Youth & Community Center).

The following is a brief description of each park and recreation facility operated by the Village. Parks and trails are listed alphabetically. The Full inventory analysis can be found in Appendix C.

4.1 American Legion Park

American Legion Park is a small pocket park located at the northeast corner of the intersection of Route 9A and Ashford Avenue. The park does not contain any recreational facilities, but rather supports the bus stop located on Route 9A just north of the intersection.

- Signage Parking signage is installed, however the park sign is small and appears to be fading.
- Parking Metered parking stalls are located near the bus shelter. Stalls are clearly marked & painted.



- Walkways A concrete sidewalk abuts the parking stalls and is in good condition.
- Bus Shelter The bus shelter is in fair condition, with some chipping & faded paint. The sign on the shelter indicated that is operated and maintained by the Rivertown's Lions Club of Ardsley, Dobbs Ferry, Irvington, and Tarrytown. The timber screen for the electrical meter on the side of the shelter is splitting.
- Retaining Wall A stacked stone wall is located at one corner of the park and is in good condition.
- Garden The plantings are in fair condition, however there was no observable mulch and the edge is poorly defined.
- Trees & Vegetation Trees in the surrounding area appeared to be in good condition, and the lawn areas were in fair condition, with some yellowing / dieback observed.

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4.2 Bicentennial Park

Bicentennial Park is one of the larger pocket parks located within the Village. The park contains a small walking trail connecting Route 9A to Village Green/ American Legion Drive, with some site furnishings such as benches and trach receptacles located along the trail. Some informational signage, a flagpole, and garden spaces are also located within this park.

• Flagpole – The flagpole was in good condition and appeared functional.



- Benches Benches appeared to be in fair condition with variable seat heights – not all benches were ADA accessible.
- Tables Tables appeared to be in good condition, however were not ADA accessible.
- Trash Receptacles Trash receptacles appeared to be in good condition and not overflowing. "Trash" and "Recycle" labels were clean and clearly visible.
- Information Kiosks Signage was in good condition and legible. They are located in the lower portion of the site along Route 9A and are not readily visible from the upper portion of the park.
- Walkways Asphalt walkways were in poor condition with extensive cracking and heaving. Slopes do not appear to be ADA compliant in all areas.
- Garden Garden areas were in good condition with well-maintained borders.
- Retaining Wall Retaining wall was in good condition and appeared structurally intact.
- Signage Park signage was present, however was very small and not readily visible.
- Lighting Some lighting was present in the park and appeared to be in good condition. Park was not observed at night so it is unclear if adequate lighting is provided.
- Lawn / Turf Turf was in fair condition, with some yellowing / dieback observed. Bare patches are present in the high-traffic areas at the upper portion of the park.
- Trees / Vegetation Trees were in good condition, some graffiti observed on rock outcroppings.

4.3 Firefighters Park

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Firefighters Park is located in the northwest corner of the intersection of Route 9A and Ashford Avenue, directly across from American Legion Park. The park contains numerous garden spaces interspersed within paver walkways and a memorial honoring the Ardsley Fire Department. A flagpole is located on site dedicated to William H. Pohlmann, former president of the Ardsley Engine Company No. 1 who passed away from the September 11th World Trade Center attack.

• Benches – Several benches are located in the plaza space and are in good condition. They are



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typically located in areas that receive a fair amount of shade. The concrete benches near the memorial had some signs of staining from water / elements.

- Memorial The memorial was in good condition and clearly visible from the road. The sculpture, plaque, and text are all clean and legible.
- Flagpole The flagpole is in good condition and appeared functional.
- Dedication Plague The dedication plaque at the base of the flagpole was in good condition, visible from the road, clean and legible.
- Signage The park sign is adequately sized and visible from the road. The sign is in good condition and appeared clean and legible.
- Garden Garden areas were in good condition with mulch, well maintained borders, and the plants appeared to be well maintained and healthy.
- Walkways Concrete sidewalks and paver plaza areas appeared to be in good condition, well maintained, and ADA compliant.
- Retaining Wall The retaining walls appeared to be in good condition.
- Lighting The bollard lights and up lighting appeared to be in good condition.

4.4 Floyd Lichtenberg Park

Floyd Lichtenberg Park is a large pocket park located adjacent to the Ardsley Public Library and contains numerous planting beds, dedication plaques, and site furnishings. A parking area is located on the other side of a drainage creek, connected to the main park area by a footbridge. The library uses the trails and walkways to support a variety of programs such as story walks.

 Pedestrian Bridge – The bridge connecting the park to the adjacent parking lot is in fair condition. Some paint was observed to be faded



or chipping, and several boards & rails were beginning to show signs of rot.

- Parking Lots The parking lot appeared to be adequate in size. Asphalt was in good condition and the pavement markings and striping were clearly defined and visible.
- Benches Benches all appeared to be of a similar style and in good condition.
- Paver Plaza Pavers are in fair condition, with several appearing to be cracked. There were uneven areas that are unlikely to be ADA compliant, and moss/vegetation was observed growing through some of the cracks.
- Lighting Light posts were evident in the park and appeared to be in good condition.
- Trash Receptacles Trash receptacles were in generally fair condition, with several different styles throughout the park.
- Tables Tables all appeared to match and were in good condition.
- Steps Timber steps were found to be in fair condition, with several treads beginning to show signs of wear and cracking.

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- Signage Signs were in good condition. The main park sign was an engraved rock which was difficult to locate and not readily visible from the road.
- Retaining Wall The timber retaining walls were in good condition and appeared to be structurally stable.
- Garden Garden areas were in good condition and appeared to be very well maintained.
- Fencing Fencing and guard rails around the lower parking lot were in good condition and did not appear to be damaged.
- Storm Culvert A storm sewer culvert is located within the park area and appears to be operational and in good condition. Fencing / grates prevent access into the culvert and are also in good condition.
- Bike Racks Bike racks were in fair condition. They did not appear to be level and were installed in the lawn area.
- Walkways Walkways were in fair condition, however were generally narrower than a standard sidewalk width.
- Lawn / Turf Turf was in good condition with few bare spots observed. An HDPE storm sewer drain line was exposed in one section of the park.
- Trees / Vegetation Trees were in good condition.

4.5 McDowell Park

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McDowell Park is one of the two larger parks located within the Village. The park contains several baseball fields used by the Ardsley Little League, as well as basketball courts and a playground. McDowell Park is one of the heaviest utilized parks within the Village of Ardsley due to the amount of athletic fields and courts, and was reported as one of the most visited parks by respondents of the public survey.



 Baseball Fields – The baseball fields are all in generally fair condition, with the exception being

Field No. 1 located in the northeast corner of the park, which appears to be the "premier" field within the park. Field No. 1 contained a backstop, fencing, dugouts with benches, scoreboard, windscreen, lighting, and turf that were all in good to excellent condition. The other baseball fields contain similar amenities in varying conditions, with some having turf that was showing evidence of stress and yellowing and others with evidence of drainage issues or missing an ADA accessible route to access the field. None of the baseball fields within the park had a warning track along the perimeter of the field.

 Batting Cage – The batting cage was in fair condition, with the fencing and netting being in generally good condition while the artificial turf mats were beginning to show signs of wear and several of the posts having exposed concrete footings above grade.



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- Basketball Courts The basketball courts are located adjacent to the parking area and consist of 2 half-size court markings on an irregularly shaped asphalt area. The pavement striping and backboards appeared to be in good condition, however did not appear to be a standard regulation size.
- T-Ball Field The T-Ball field was in fair condition, with dugouts and bleachers showing signs of wear and several bare batches of grass in the field area.
- Parking Area The parking area was in fair condition, with some evidence of cracking and heaving throughout the pavement. The parking stall striping was faded and difficult to see in some areas.
- Trash Receptacles Trash receptacles were in good condition with the same style being utilized throughout the park. "Trash" and "Recycle" labels were clean and clearly visible, with some minor graffiti observed.
- Snack Stand The snack / concessions structure appeared to be in fair condition. The building
 was locked preventing an interior assessment; however, the exterior paint was found to be
 chipping in several areas.
- Playground The playground was found to be in good condition with safety surfacing installed beneath the structure and no graffiti visible.
- Bleachers Bleachers throughout the park were found to be in fair condition. Each baseball field had bleachers for viewing the game, however some were not ADA accessible.
- Bathroom Building The bathroom facility was found to be in good condition. The interior fixtures and plumbing appeared functional and to be in good condition as well.
- Storage Shed The storage shed was in generally good condition, with some paint observed to be chipping on the exterior.
- Pavilion The pavilion structure was found to be in fair condition. The concrete pad beneath the pavilion was in good condition, however the fire pit appeared to missing some sections and the vent above was degrading and rusted.
- Fencing The perimeter fence around the park was in poor condition. Much of the fence was rusted and warping, with multiple gaps in the fence and vegetation overgrowing some areas.
- Stairs The timber stairs leading to the baseball field at the back of the park were in poor condition, with uneven spacing between the treads, which also were not level. The handrails were in fair condition.
- Garden The garden spaces appeared to be well maintained, with mulch and a defined border.
- Monuments The park contains numerous dedication and memorial plaques, all of which were found to be in good condition, clean, and legible.
- Trees / Vegetation Trees were in generally good condition.

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4.6 Pascone Park

Pascone Park is the second large park operated by the Village, and contains several playground areas, multipurpose fields, tennis courts, a softball field, and a skate park, among other amenities. It was listed as one of the more frequently visited parks within the Village by respondents of the Public Survey.

 Playgrounds – The playground areas in Pascone Park were found to be in generally poor to fair condition. There was inadequate safety surfacing beneath the northern play area, with weeds and



grass growing through all locations. There appeared to be appropriate signage located on site, and the equipment was found to be in fair condition with the exception of the northern swing set and seesaw, which were rusted and did not have signage present.

- Skate Park The skate park was found to be in good condition. The fencing was beginning to show signs of wear and the pavement appeared warped in some areas.
- Basketball Court The basketball court was in fair condition, with some pavement failure along the edges of the court and minor ponding observed. The backboards were beginning to show signs of wear, and pavement markings were in good condition.
- Softball Field The softball field was in fair condition, with some weeds observed in the infield and no safety guard on the top rail of the perimeter fencing. Dugout benches were installed however did not have shade cover.
- Gazebo The gazebo was in fair condition, with minor graffiti observed and some loose rails. The access ramp to the gazebo is not ADA compliant.
- Restroom Facility The restrooms were found to be in fair condition, with moss evident on the roof and graffiti present on the exterior walls. The interior fixtures and plumbing appeared to be in good condition.
- Tennis Courts The tennis courts were in good condition, with no ponding evident and the athletic appurtenances such as netting appearing to be relatively new. Pavement color sealcoat and striping were in good condition.
- Parking Lot The paring area was in good condition, with striping clear and visible and minimal cracking of asphalt. The ADA parking areas were marked with outdated symbols and based on a count of stalls, it appears that the park is short 2 ADA stalls.
- Picnic Tables The picnic tables within the park were found to be in good condition.
- Trash Receptacles Trash receptacles were in good condition with the same style being utilized throughout the park. "Trash" and "Recycle" labels were clean and clearly visible.
- Signage The main park sign located near the roundabout and park entrance was in good condition and appeared well maintained. The smaller park sign near the parking lot was in good condition, however not very eye catching when entering.
- Flagpole The flagpole was found to be in good condition and appeared functional.

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- Walkways Walkways were comprised of asphalt and in generally fair condition, with some section on Veteran's Way appearing cracked and uneven.
- Historic Buildings The buildings and associated informational signage were in good condition.
- Monuments The park contains numerous dedication and memorial plaques, all of which were found to be in good condition, clean, and legible.
- Multi-Use Field The multi-use athletic field was in fair condition, with some bare spots evident and an uneven surface not suitable for league or game use.
- Garden Garden spaces were in good condition with mulch and well maintained borders.
- Lawn / Turf Turf was in good condition with few bare spots observed.
- Trees / Vegetation Trees were in good condition.

4.7 Pocost Park

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Pocost Park is a small pocket park located at the corner

of Ashford Avenue and American Legion Drive. There are no formal recreation facilities supported by this area. A paver walkways with memorial bricks and a dedication plaque to former Mayor Michael Pocost are located within the pocket park.

- Benches The benches along the walkway were in good condition, however were located within the stone mulch area and not ADA accessible.
- Trash Receptacles The trash receptacles located along the walkway were in good condition, however not easy to access.
- Planters The planters themselves were found to be in fair condition, however they did not appear to be watered and the plants were beginning to show signs of heat stress. They appeared to be too small for the area.
- Signage Signage for the park was in good condition a plague with the park name and dedication information was embedded into a rock, however was small and not visible from the road.
- Walkway The paver pathway was in good condition, with minor settlement observed at both ends where the pavers interfaced with concrete. The concrete sidewalk was in fair condition and shows signs of cracking in several areas.
- Fence The timber guardrail appeared to be in good condition and freshly painted.
- Trees / Vegetation Trees were in good condition.



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4.8 Silliman Park

Silliman Park is a small pocket park located at the southeast corner of the intersection of Route 9A and Ashford Avenue, extending east along Ashford Avenue for a short distance. The park primarily contains planting areas and a stone dust walking trail.

- Benches Benches at either end of the walking trail were found to be in good condition, however were different styles & colors.
- Trash Receptacles The trash receptacle within the park was found to be in good condition.
- Monuments The park contains a small stone monument dedicated to William P. Van Dorn. The monument is in fair condition, showing some signs of wear, and is small and difficult to see from the road.
- Flagpole The flagpole is in good condition and appears functional.



- Walkway The walkway is comprised of stone dust and appeared to be in good condition, however, was not ADA compliant in some areas. Loose fill walkways are difficult to keep ADA compliant and require extensive maintenance to ensure the walking surface is level.
- Garden The garden spaces were well maintained and in good condition, and mulched. No border was present to keep mulch contained, and some areas were spilling into the walkway.
- Peace Pole The peace pole was in good condition and appeared well maintained.
- Trees / Vegetation Trees appeared to be in good condition, located throughout the park area.

4.9 Thelma Zimmer – William Van Dorn Youth & Community Center

The Youth & Community Center is a small building located at 18 Center Street across from the shopping center. There is limited on-street parking nearby, and the shopping center parking lot is restricted to patrons of the shops only.

- Gathering Room The main gathering area is well let, open, and clean. The walls were recently repainted and appeared to be in good condition.
- Kitchen The kitchen area appeared to be in good condition, with appliances installed for food preparation and clean surfaces. No evidence of food stains or debris were found.
- Game Room The game room appeared to be clean and well lit with two windows, containing a pool table, foosball table, and general purpose folding table. Staff indicated that the room was underutilized.

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- Television The television in the front window was in good condition and newly installed. It was operational and displays messages and information about the community center.
- Storage Area The storage areas were well lit, clean, and organized.
- Bathrooms The bathrooms were clean and appeared to be functional and in good condition.
- Office The office space appeared to be in good condition.
- Trash Receptacles The trash receptables appeared to be in good condition and not overflowing.
- Parking Parking for the community center is very limited, and is primarily served by on street parking. There are not enough on-street parking stalls to service the building with its current use and would be severely inadequate if services at the center were to expand. Some residents use the parking lot at the shopping center across the street even though the operator of the shopping center has placed signs indicating the lot is for patrons only.
- Bench The bench outside the community center is in good condition.

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5.0 PUBLIC ENGAGEMENT

Public engagement is fundamental to the master planning process. This input, whether received during a public forum, in a survey, or face-to-face, helps the team form a well-rounded, multi-faceted comprehension of the unique challenges and needs of the community.

The Weston & Sampson team facilitated several stakeholder meetings with key representatives of community groups and Village departments and a public meeting open to the entire Village to solicit thoughts and feedback on the importance of park facilities within Ardsley. Village staff also attended the Senior Picnic and Ardsley Day to distribute questionnaires and gather additional public input.

Four focus group meetings were held in late September 2022, with each meeting lasting approximately 1 hour. The responses from each meeting were generally similar, with attendees praising the Village's recreation commission for always being open to new ideas and responsive to community needs and praise for the baseball fields and general maintenance of the park facilities. Weaknesses were generally focused on the lack of non-baseball field facilities, the underutilization of the community center, the disjointed nature in which improvements are planned and implemented, and lack of shade within some of the major parks. A wide array of suggestions for improvements were brought up, including property acquisition for new facilities such as multi-sport or cricket fields, increasing community connections through trails & complete streets, improvements to branding & communication, partnering with the local schools or other community groups, and increased non-sport-oriented programming.

At the Senior Picnic / BBQ, approximately 30 people attended and participated in the public engagement process. Attendees shared their thoughts on improvements to the senior-oriented events, including more bus trips to nearby attractions such as apple picking, improving communication methods to reach the senior population, development of a dedicated senior space, and the development of connective walking trails within the community and parks. At Ardsley Day, attendees could share their thoughts in a comment box set up at the event. Suggestions for improvements included development of a splash pad, pool, or water park, creating playgrounds and play areas that are more challenging for older kids, creating a dedicated cricket field, and construction of dedicated pickleball courts.

On November 3rd, a public meeting was held at the Community Center to solicit feedback from any resident who wanted to share their thoughts on the master plan and parks and recreation facilities. One recurring theme of the night was the suggestion that the Village was considering removing some of the existing sports fields to make room for other improvements, which the Village clarified had not been discussed or considered as part of this process. Residents asked questions regarding how specific improvements may be funded, adding additional lighting to sports fields at McDowell Park, construction of a previously considered removable bubble/dome over the tennis courts to extend the playing season, and expansion of cricket facilities to support the growing interest in the sport within Ardsley. Attendees generally expressed their satisfaction with the conditions of McDowell Park and the associated baseball fields, and suggested that improvements should focus on Pascone Park, which was described as

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having outdated and uninteresting playground equipment, not having enough shaded areas, and generally as being underutilized. Opinions were mixed on the inclusion of a spray park or pool, with some residents stating that such facilities would be beneficial for smaller children while other believed such improvements were not needed and that an agreement should be worked out with Greenburgh to allow access to the Greenburgh pool.

In addition to public meetings and face-to-face interaction, an online public survey was created and made open to all residents of Ardsley to provide more detailed feedback on specific park and recreation facilities and programs that they would like to see expanded within the Village. The survey asked respondents to rate how satisfied they were with the existing facilities within Ardsley, how often they visited parks or enrolled in programs offered, describe how they would best get information related to park & recreation offerings, among other questions to help gauge public opinion and aid in establishing priorities for improvements.

The project team received 533 survey responses and extensive conversational comments. Respondents relayed that they were generally satisfied with the quality of Village of Ardsley parks and recreation facilities, that respondents overwhelmingly utilized a Village recreational facility at least once a week, that playgrounds and athletic courts/fields are top priorities in meeting the needs of residents, and that a new community center would be beneficial for the community, specifically for young children and teenagers. Respondents were generally not in favor of installation of new splash pads, ice rinks, parklets, or picnic areas. The Farmers Market was also identified as an area for potential expansion and improvement, followed by music and arts in the park and programs for youth and teenagers. Respondents indicated that continued and improved maintenance of facilities, increased lighting, and the addition of community facilities and programs would increase respondents use of Village park and recreation facilities. Respondents were generally mixed on how effective the Village was at communicating with the public, and indicated that updates to the village website, social media, and email blasts would be the best way to get information out.

5.1 Public Survey Results

5.1.1 Survey Demographics

- Respondents had on average lived in Ardsley for 11 years.
- Approximately 53 percent of respondents identified as female.
- Approximately 82 percent of respondents identified their household condition as a couple with children in the home; the average household size was 4.
- Approximately 61 percent of respondents identified as white/Caucasian.

5.1.2 Summary of Park & Recreation Facilities

- Approximately 66% of respondents rated the overall quality of park and recreation facilities as either "satisfactory" or "outstanding."
- Approximately 53% of respondents stated they visited a Village of Ardsley park or recreation facility at least once per week.

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- The 3 facilities that received the highest importance rating were:
 - 1. Athletic Fields.
 - 2. Playgrounds.
 - 3. Community & Neighborhood Parks.
- Approximately 58% of respondents stated that they believed the pocket parks in the Village provided an adequate benefit to the community.
- Approximately 61% of respondents stated that they believed there were enough parks & recreation facilities within the Village.

5.1.3 Summary of Park & Recreation Programs

- Approximately 77% of respondents rated the overall quality of park and recreation programs as either "satisfactory" or "outstanding."
- A majority (approximately 54%) of respondents stated that they attended a Village of Ardsley event once every few months.
- A majority (approximately 51%) of respondents stated that they had never participated in a Village of Ardsley community program, such as a class.
- Respondents were generally split between participating in a Village of Ardsley recreation program, such as a sports league, at least once a week (approximately 32%) or never (approximately 35%).

5.1.4 Summary of Community Center

- Approximately 42% of respondents stated that a new community center was needed in the Village; approximately 36% of respondents stated they were unsure of had no opinion on the community center.
- Children and Teenagers were the two groups respondents were most likely to state would be best served by a new community center.

5.1.5 Summary of Overall Goals & Desires

- The top three items that received the highest importance rating for the Village to address over the next five to ten years were:
 - 1. Improvements or Renovation of Existing Playgrounds.
 - 2. Improvements or Renovation of Existing Park Facilities
 - 3. Preservation of Open Space and/or Acquisition of Land
- The top three facility goals that received the highest importance rating for the Village to address were:
 - 1. Additional Playground Equipment or Improvements to Existing Playgrounds.
 - 2. Additional Athletic Fields or Improvements to Existing Athletic Fields.
 - 3. Water Features, Splash Pads, or Spray Parks.
- The top three program goals that received the highest importance rating for the Village to address were:
 - 1. Farmers Market.
 - 2. Music & Art in the Park.
 - 3. Programs for Teenagers.
- The top three programs that received the highest rating as to what would increase respondent's engagement and utilization with Village facilities were:

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- 1. Improving the Condition & Maintenance of Parks & Community Facilities
- 2. Improved Communication about Offerings
- 3. More Community Programs & Events.
- The top three items that respondents stated would increase their utilization of Village park and recreation facilities were:
 - 1. Improving the Condition & Maintenance of Park & Community Facilities.
 - 2. Adding Lighting to Facilities.
 - 3. Additional Community Facilities & Amenities.
- The top three methods of communication that respondents stated would be the best ways to get information about park and recreation facilities in the Village were:
 - 1. The Village of Ardsley Website.
 - 2. Emails from the Village of Ardsley.
 - 3. Social Media.

5.1.6 Conclusion

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The survey responses listed above are not an exhaustive representation of each question asked or more nuanced responses; rather, these responses are a sampling of the types of questions asked and an overview of responses. A complete summary of the survey can be found in Appendix B.

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6.0 RECOMMENDATIONS

This section describes recommendations to enhance the level of service and quality of facilities offered in the Village of Ardsley through improvement of existing sites, development of new facilities, organizational enhancements, financial improvements, increased programming, improved safety, and potential partnerships. The Village of Ardsley operates nine parks and recreation facilities within the Village. While the Village of Ardsley has great facilities that are dutifully maintained, there are several general recommendations to further improve the parks & recreation facilities and programs. In addition, there are site-specific recommendations that have been developed for each Village-operated facility.

To support the goals of the Village and help meet the needs and desires of the community expressed during the public engagement process, it is recommended that the Village coordinate and explore partnerships with other public and private entities. Examples include the Town of Greenburgh, Westchester County, House of Sports, and the Ardsley Union Free School District. Partnerships with these entities would allow the Village to utilize new or existing facilities not directly operated by the Village that would be capable of supporting a wide range of program opportunities, such as the Ardsley High School athletic field, training facilities at House of Sports, or passive recreation facilities such as pavilions at VE Macy Park. While maintaining and improving upon the Village's owned and operated facilities is an important step in achieving recreation goals, the Village would be well served by exploring how best to utilize other facilities and spaces within the Village.

Recommendations are divided into near-term (0-2 years), mid-term (3-5 years), long term (5-10 years), or on-going (continued maintenance). Recommendations are further classified as follows:

- Compliance: Improvements include audits or assessments necessary to identify and renovate areas within the facility to comply with the latest codes and standards.
- Maintenance: Improvements include repairs necessary to maintain and operate facilities to meet the current goals and objectives of the City.
- Upgrades: Improvements include modifications or rehabilitations necessary to improve efficiencies, expand program offerings, comply with the latest codes and standards, or introduce new facilities without the need for a comprehensive reconstruction.
- Comprehensive: Improvements include reconstruction or replacement of current park facilities to improve efficiencies, reduce financial burdens, or introduce new programs and facilities.

6.1 General Programming Recommendations

As a result of meeting with staff, program data review and analysis, the following general program recommendations were developed for the Village:

- Near-Term
 - Expand staffing levels to address the need to balance and address concerns with program catalog and life cycle. This will provide the opportunity to add new and trending programs without deleting current successful programs (*Upgrades*)
 - Analyze the feasibility of continued offering of adult softball (Maintenance)

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- o Increase marketing and promotion of programs and special events (Maintenance)
- Consider targeting geographic areas with low participant outreach (Maintenance)
- Set up registration software to allow collection of class cancellations and demographic self-reporting (*Upgrades*)
- Mid-Term
 - Increase partnerships with other service providers to increase programming by providing spaces to recreate with reduced barriers to access (Upgrades)
- On-Going
 - Review the programming life cycle to establish decommissioning or rejuvenation plans for the program portfolio (*Maintenance*)
 - Become students of Village program data by developing, maintaining, and regularly analyzing program database (*Maintenance*)

6.2 General Facility Recommendations

- Near-Term
 - Install ADA compliant routes to parks & recreation facilities where necessary (Compliance / Upgrades)
 - Develop maintenance standards of level of service (Maintenance)
 - o Increase special event programming (Upgrades)
- Mid-Term
 - o Improve/ upgrade signage (wayfinding, main park signs, parking, etc.) (Upgrades)
 - Conduct feasibility study for expansion of existing or construction of a new community center (*Comprehensive*)

6.4 Conclusion

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Parks across the Village of Ardsley are in general very well maintained, with the greatest limiting factor being the amount of real estate available for recreation. Areas for improvement are typically related to minor adjustments to ensure ADA compliance, upkeep on general maintenance items, and installation of larger or additional signage to better denote park spaces. In some cases, complete removal or reconstruction of unsafe or substandard facilities is recommended, while in others, repair or upgrades to these features may be considered. Longer term recommendations typically involve the relocation or expansion of large-scale recreation facilities such as entire ball fields to better utilize the available space and make room for new opportunities within the park spaces. In all parks, accessibility and improved wayfinding signage is recommended to increase usership and provide a safe community environment.

Like many communities, the Village of Ardsley strives to keep up with the demand for programming and facilities within its park system. It operates a wide range of programs through the Village Recreation Department, while also partnering with local organizations to support little leagues and other sporting clubs.

7.0 FUNDING & "FRIENDS GROUP"

In addition to the Village contributing funds for the planning, design and construction of park facility improvements, funding may potentially be secured from a variety of other sources.

The creation of a "Friends of Ardsley Parks and Recreation", as a 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization, that works with the Parks and Recreation Department of the Village of Ardsley, would contribute to improving Ardsley's parks, recreational programming and their usership - by raising funds, organizing volunteers and increasing awareness.

A "Friends Group" would consist of a steering committee and organized under the New York State Notfor-profit Corporation Law with an eight-member board of directors. In addition, The Friends group could register as an Internal Revenue Service public charity with tax-exempt status pursuant to Section 501(c)(3) of the IRS code, as well as register with the Charities Bureau of the Office of the Attorney General of the State of New York.

Since then, the Friends group has participated in various activities and events, including:

- Organizing an annual I Love My Park Day
- Creating and managing the Commemorative Tree & Bench Program
- Maintaining a Scholarship Fund to help residents in need participate in Parks and Recreation activities.
- Assisting the Parks and Recreation Department by ...
- Raising funds for park improvements and programs
- Enlisting volunteers for Parks and Recreation projects
- Researching policy options
- Sharing information about Parks and Recreation events and programs

- 1. It's a plan and just that. It's not a final proposal or an exact architectural diagram of what is going in. It simply gives options and proposes novel ways to utilize the land.
- 2. It will contain funding models so that the parks department can apply for grants but is in no way funded or approved yet. In order to do any of this we need a plan then we need to figure out how to pay for the improvements as a village. In partnership with the village if we are serious about expediting these kind of projects we should also consider a "friends of the park" 501c to help solicit benefactors to make our dreams a reality.
- 3. Lastly, in terms of implementation, even the most aggressive of timelines would have the past one project completed in 2yrs. The planners are taking lessons

learned from neighboring villages to help speed up our own redevelopment plan but this park isn't happening tomorrow.

Thanks Steve and team for coming up with this and taking our feedback.

Citizen 3: I hope they make use of public tennis courts free. With such a hefty budget for large-scale changes it seems that's the least we could do!

Citizen 4: I am disappointed to see a recommendation for turf. Turf is plastic and has tiny beads. In addition to the fact that replacing grass with plastic is unsettling, those small beads are dangerous for children and animals.

Is the Parks Board taking official public comment on this, or not until the plan next month?

Citizen 5: Thanks Steve - lots of great ideas! Is a swimming pool a possibility? Would add a lot of value to the quality of life for families especially for those with young children! And if this is not a viable option, can the village negotiate with the village of greenburgh for rights to join the af veteran pool (perhaps by paying a supplemental fee?) is this a possibility?

This is a time where leadership would be valuable in steering the village away from this mistake despite 30% support among survey respondents. To waste money and space on a resource that only a small group of our youngest children can use for 4 or max 5 months out of the year is just not a great use of resources.

My name is Joe Sablow I am representing the Ardsley Curling Club . At the present time the club is located on the grounds of the Ardsley Country Club in Dobbs Ferry. We have been exploring options to relocate to a new location.

I am a long time Ardsley resident . I saw on Facebook the the Village is exploring projects for upgrading our parks. I would very much like to discuss the possibility of working with the Village.

If you are not familiar with it, curling is the winter Olympic sport played on ice. Our club has been in existence since 1932 and in the current location since 1966. The idea would be to share the facility with the village. Our season only runs from late September to mid April. The remaining spring and summer months the village would have total access. Please let me know if this is something that the village might wish to explore further.

Response:

Hi Craig,

Thank for your email. I agree it is exciting.

My understanding is that that the consultants are preparing recommendations for all the parks. They have not completed renderings for all the Parks. I believe they started with Pascone since it wasn't a one of our main parks and needs the most extensive overhauling. I agree there is an opportunity for more seating in the lower portion of Silliman. Our original restoration plan envisioned that.

It is a little challenging to make an inviting space while it looks across at the empty gas station parcel. Given the topography I have thought that having a pedestrian bridge across the Brook exiting at the gas station lot would provide better access to the lower space from the sidewalk on Saw Mill River Road.

In our conversations with the consultants that we are looking for McDowell to become a more well-balance park with attraction and use to the community beyond baseball. They understand the hat charge and I look forward to their recommendations to accomplish that. The addition of the fill to the back section should provide us with additional space to diversify uses.

1. I McDowell field 3 were to be changed to multi purpose turf consideration should be give to add some other park feature than baseball field to space currently occupied by field 4. It would be nice to have a balance of a little more park on both sides of the village for resident like myself which live on Heatherdell side and not Ashford. A track could be installed or some other feature. I would ask you please suggest that to the consultants.

Since you are still accepting suggestions, I have prepared a few comments listed below:

<u>Survey</u>

Weston & Sampson did an excellent job of outreach and compilation of surveys. Analyses were extremely informative.

Bicentennial Park

Bicentennial Park is a 0.7 acre parcel leased from NYC Department of Environmental Protection (DEP). It sits atop a cavernous 60 inch pipe. This pipe runs east to west, perpendicular to the NYCDEP aqueduct. The aqueduct runs north to south below the Ardsley Library parcel. The pipe serves as the emergency "blowoff" for the aqueduct.

In 1976, Ardsley Kiwanis Club planted 13 cherry trees in Lower Bicentennial Park (west side of Park, along Route 9A), in honor of America's Bicentennial. Many of these survive today and still provide a breath taking display of pink blooms every spring, a scene truly iconic of the Village. In 1980, John Arnold ASLA designed additional elements of the Park, including the existing Upper (east side) paths, benches and plantings. Bicentennial Park is an official site along the Revolutionary War Washington Rochambeau Heritage Trail. In 2003, two commemorative signs were placed in the Lower Park as part of Heritage NY CRISP – Collaborative Regional Interpretive Sign Project (there are also signs at Concord Road, McDowell Park and Odell House in the Town of Greenburgh). The Village of Ardsley received a grant from Empire State Development Corporation (Project G543 CEFAP – Community Enhancement Facilities Assistance Program) for improvements to downtown, including installation of a pathway connecting Upper and Lower Bicentennial. This connecting pathway was completed in 2003 using those grant funds. In 2015, the pathway was paved as a concrete sidewalk using funds from NYS Office of Parks, Recreation and Historic Preservation Grant PKS-14-TA-020, sponsored by Representative Abinanti.

Observation of the Park shows usage of the Upper area as a sitting and eating area at all daylight times and as a play area after school, especially for Middle Schoolers. They have impromptu soccer, football, softball and games of tag in the space. The Lower area is among the very few shaded parklets in the Village. People are always seen sitting on the pathway wall enjoying a respite from the heat in warm months.

It is suggested that the proposed paver plaza be eliminated. Additional hard surface will eliminate the nice grassy play space for the students. Additional impervious surface is not desirable either. Moreover, negotiations with NYCDEP are quite complicated for any proposal and they may not favor this hardscape element.

The trees in the Park are regularly pruned. More ambitious pruning to eliminate shading is not desirable. Upper Park already has areas of intense sunlight. Garden beds, regularly tended by the Village, already exist around the Heritage Trail signs, along the pathway and around the flagpole. If additional garden beds are added, they should be native perennial and as self-sustaining as possible. Community gardens seem like a lovely idea, but they quickly become overgrown and full of weeds. The Village is already struggling with gardens in other locations around the Village. Our Department of Public Works should be carefully consulted about any additional garden installations as it always falls to our small Public Works staff to maintain them.

Pascone Park

The Pump Track seems like a whim, not a responsible choice. A Pump Track is a non-stop race track, not just flat, but with moguls! An open, unregulated facility for all types of wheeled items, skates and bikes, all racing along on a narrow track, a sure recipe for collisions. Dirt tracks quickly degrade and need tremendous maintenance, asphalt similarly needs upkeep for safety, and concrete costs in the six-figure range. Besides the liability aspect, if children tire of it, you will be stuck with a permanent installation that has no alternate use. Moreover, it seems a shame to convert that green space to impervious surface. If an impervious installation must be considered, that might be a place to put the Pickle Ball Court.

Sacrificing the small Soccer Field for a parking lot does not seem reasonable. This is the only field that has acceptable drainage. Please consider locating the Recreation Building to the northeast corner of the Park, fronting on Ashford Avenue. Place the parking lot there, too, with entry from Ashford Avenue. Drainage is poor there, but can certainly be improved during construction of the building.

McDowell Park

McDowell Park is a jewel, the premier Little League facility in the County.

The new space that has opened at the southwest corner, west of Field #4, could be used for a new playground area. If the area is plumbed, a really nice Splash Pad facility could be located there, and there would be excellent drainage. A well-drained water park facility will be easier to maintain in sanitary condition than one located at Pascone Park in a wet area.

Bridge Street Park/Picnic Area

There is a 0.2 acre parcel at the southwest corner of Bridge Street Plaza (Bridge Street Plaza is southwest from the corner of Ashford Avenue & Route 9A). Riviera Bakehouse, Carvel, Stagioni Restaurant and Ardsley Market Fresh Deli are located within one block of this parcel. The parcel could be a wonderful Saw Mill Riverfront sitting and picnic area. Moreover, the parcel would serve as a key element in our commitment to our LWRP (Local Waterfront Revitalization Plan). Please include a proposal for this important site.






Online Survey Summary - Demographics

Average Ardsley Residency: 11 Years


Respondent Race/Ethnicity






Online Survey Summary - Facilities

In the past 12 months, how frequently have you and your household...










How would you describe the overall quality of the recreation programs in the Village of Ardsley? How satisfied have you and your household been with the quality of the Village of Ardsley...











4. **DEPARTMENT REPORTS**

1. LEGAL

1.a Village Attorney, Robert Ponzini stated there is nothing to report other than the ongoing items he is working on with staff.

2. MANAGER

2.a Village Manager, Joseph L. Cerretani read the following report:

Good evening, Mayor and Board. Before I begin with my regular report, I did want to provide an update that was requested of me at the last Village Board Meeting. There was a member of the public who described an interaction with a Village resident. The details of the interaction were disputed. I am unable to either corroborate or refute any of the statements made; however, I am able to provide some facts from my findings. After speaking with the Building Inspector, none of the actions taken by the owner of 11 Morningside rose to the level of a violation. The property has multiple permits for construction, and it is entirely allowable to have refuse generated offsite to be brought to a dumpster at another site. We will evaluate the condition of the curbs, and, if necessary, pursue the appropriate steps to remedy.

During the public comment period of the Board meeting, time is allowed for constructive comments, complaints and criticisms from any member of the public, not just Village residents. The village is able to include some reasonable restrictions, but public comments in general, including complaints of any nature, are not only allowed, but should be anticipated and expected as part of open government.

To me, this appears to be essentially a private matter involving two individuals, one of whom is a resident who happens to be active in a village organization. It does not appear to me that the interaction involved the organization. If the organization, in this case the Historical Society, considers it an issue they wish to address, that is entirely at their discretion. Again, I am unable to either corroborate or refute any of the statements made by either individual, but I did want to provide this update.

- 1. **NEW DPW CONSTRUCTION PROJECT:** The plumbers and electricians are continuing to finish the underground infrastructure, which is expected to be finished in the administrative section and lower garage section by the end of the week. The concrete floors began getting poured today. We are expecting delivery of the steel for the building structure May 22 through May 25 in multiple loads. We anticipate that this week that the high-voltage power, as well as low-voltage utilities will be switched over to the newly run underground infrastructure, thus allowing us to remove the utility poles on-site, which will be necessary in order to properly move the steel throughout the construction zone. The site is being prepped with Item 4, which is necessary for the cranes to operate in the erection of all steelwork.
- 2. **LED LIGHTING CONVERSION:** Beginning this week, we will have all of the light fixtures in Village Hall switched out to high-efficiency LED fixtures, as well as having motion-sensor lighting installed in areas throughout the building. This project is being funded 100% through a NYSERDA grant awarded to the Village.
- 3. **BOARD ROOM/COURT ROOM REHABILITATION:** As the first phase of the project is nearing completion and the new camera system and hybrid meeting capabilities are configured, we will begin the next phase of the project with includes for painting and carpeting in the Court Room. This phase of the project is expected to begin in the late spring/early summer. Special thanks to Anissa Slade for securing a grant that will pay 100% of

these costs. We have also completed an overhaul of our cable access room, special thanks to George Malone, Ann Marie Rocco, Larry Tomaso, David DiGregorio and the DPW for their assistance. By mid-summer, we will have a Board Room with updated broadcasting capabilities with a beautiful, fresh look.

- 4. **FULL-TIME POSITION AVAILABLE:** The Village is currently advertising for a full-time recreation assistant position. Anyone interested please go to <u>www.ardsleyvillage.com</u> to get more details on the job description and how to apply. Applications will be due this Friday, May 19.

6.a Recreation Supervisor, Patricia Lacy

Mayor Kaboolian accepted the Recreation Department report under submission.

Good evening Mayor and Board of Trustees the Recreation Department continues to be super busy rolling into the Spring Season. To date we have several spring classes running: Men's softball, 3 different leveled chess classes, gaga ball, video game coding, lego robotics, a developmental basketball program, grit ninja, pee wee soccer, defensive driving and more.

Along with programs, the recreation department has been busy organizing special events. We recently hosted our 2nd annual Ardsley 5K in memory of Bill Dinaso, we had a total of 199 runners it was an amazing event. Of course this wouldn't have been possible without the utmost support from Tony Vacca, the Police Dept., Highway Dept., ASVAC, Ardsley High School's cross country coach Henry Leone and team, our very own Youth Advocate Amanda Casey and all other volunteers. Team work is everything!!!!!

June 22nd is our very popular Ice Cream Social from 6:00 pm to 8:00 pm at Pascone Park, there will also be live music.

I had the opportunity and pleasure to talk to Dillan Faulkner from Backyard Sports Plus an organization that offers programs to children with special needs. This is something I would love to see happen within the Village of Ardsley, we will make it happen. Our thoughts were to run a special event in the village and see the type of response we get and go from there, I will keep you posted.

Our facilities report is as follows: **The Community Center** continues to be well rented. To date we have taken in close to 68 rentals totaling over \$21,000, 31 were village rentals and 37 were non-village rentals.

As for our **Parks** between AYSO, Greenburgh United, cricket, one day food truck permits, field and park rentals we have taken in over \$17,000.

The recreation Dept. continues to work side by side with the AMDI committee. They had a great turnout for the Holi Event April 23rd, June 10th we will celebrate Pride Day and Juneteenth on June 17th.

6.b Ardsley Youth Advocate, Amanda Casey read the following report:

Ardsley Village Board Meeting Monday 5/15/23

The Ardsley Youth Advocate programs have been going well thus far and now that I have this year under my belt, I feel familiarized with my position and am excited to prepare and plan for another year as Ardsley Youth Advocate!

I started up the programs the second week of October, and since then there have been two programs running at the community center every week (aside from school breaks; winter recess, spring break, winter break and if I was unable to host due to sickness)

The reason I started the program Oct 12th was to allow myself to get integrated into both Ardsley Middle School, High School and the community! This time (September to October 12th) allowed me to outreach and recruit High school students as well as Middle School students too. I attended the AMS back to school night in September where I was introduced to the Middle School Principal, Stu and the counseling team. When I attended Back to School Night, I handed out my flyers; promoting the program to parents who stopped by the tables as they entered the school and explained my role.

My two programs: Homework help Wednesday and Middle School Hangout on Fridays have been successful and have gradually grown! Typically, most of the students who have attended the Homework Help on Wednesdays HW attend my hangout Friday. *I'd say around 80% of the kids are in both Wednesdays and Fridays programs*.

I find the students really look forward to coming to the center after school, I think it's also a great way to get students who don't normality mingle in school to come together here i've seen a lot of friendships form- I also have found out a lot of people don't really have people over their houses for hangouts- so it allows for students to socialize out of school in a neutral location.

My time in Ardsley has been spent doing a plethora of outreach and involvement. I have attended AMS Youth 2 Youth meetings with Allison Mastrogiacomo, student assistant counselor at the middle school as well as participate in her Babysitting Certification classes she does for students and monthly awareness activities that I also do over at the High School. My time spent at Ardsley High School is spent doing activities and putting together awareness events that are for monthly topics and themes; Red ribbon week, distracted driving awareness, great american smoke out, healthy brain day and alcohol awareness are just a few examples of what topics I focus on as Student assistance counselor. These awareness activities I do are a great way for me to meet high school students and get them to spread the word about my programs and increase volunteers! They also have increased my instagram following! *If you don't already follow @ardsleyyouthadvocate on instagram*! I post facts and current information about drugs, alcohol and promote what monthly themes and awareness that's going on at the HS and MS level.

The high school students really are what make the programs I run engaging and enjoyable for the younger middle schoolers. The role that the Highschool students have gives them a sense of purpose and involvement- they really are leaders! They give me feedback and suggestions on what we can do for the upcoming year to get more people in the high school to join!

A few had suggested creating flyers- student made instead of myself There have been students who might not have gone to school that day for one reason or another and they have come to the hangout!

Ace. C 8th grade student has said that she will always remember the community center being the best part of her middle school experience

Allison and I offered SASs Hidden In plain Sight presentation on March 29th that brought in 16 parents from the community! Parents expressed their appreciation knowing there are places their children can go to in the HS and MS to go to for support especially around topics like drug and alcohol.

We all know that when children do not have a strong support system or resources available, sometimes it can increase their involvement with substance use or risky behavior. The Ardsley Youth advocate program helps increase emotional wellness, community involvement which makes this position a protective factor. They are spending their time mingling with friends, getting support from High School Students and seeing positive role models right in their community; Trish Lacey, Detective Tony Vacca, Officer Goldstein and myself, who are all friendly faces, positive resources for students to seek out if they need support.

Mayor Kaboolian suggested taking her program to Pascone Park to attract more participation and increase the awareness.

Chapter 18, Code of Ethics New text is in <u>bold underline</u> and deleted text is in <mark>highlighted strikethrough</mark>

§ 18-15 **Political solicitations.**

A. No municipal officer or employee shall directly or indirectly compel or induce a subordinate municipal officer or employee to make, or promise to make, any political contribution, whether by gift of money, service or other thing of value.

B. No municipal officer or employee may act or decline to act in relation to appointing, hiring or promoting, discharging, disciplining, or in any manner changing the official rank, status or compensation of any municipal officer or employee, or an applicant for a position as a municipal officer or employee, on the

basis of the giving or withholding or neglecting to make any contribution of money or service or any other valuable thing for any political purpose.

C. <u>Notwithstanding any other provision of this chapter, members of the Village</u> <u>Board of Trustees and all paid Village employees, including the Village Attorney, are</u> <u>prohibited from serving as a district leader, officer or part of the nominating process</u> <u>for endorsing candidates for Village office for any partisan political party which</u> <u>engages in political campaigning or electioneering within the Village.</u>

6.3 Consider a Resolution in Support of the Birds and Bees Protection Act [New York S699B (Hoylman et al.)/A7429 (Englebright et al.)]

Moved by Trustee Bencosme, Seconded by Trustee DiJusto and passed unanimously.

WHEREAS, the *Birds and Bees Protection Act* concerns use of neonicotinoids, or "neonics," which is a class of neurotoxic pesticides that includes imidacloprid, thiamethoxam, clothianidin, dinotefuran, and acetamiprid;

WHEREAS, research shows that widespread use of neonics is a leading cause of declines in honey bees as well as wild pollinators and a threat to birds, fish, and entire ecosystems;

WHEREAS, New York's agricultural economy depends on healthy populations of bees and other pollinators to produce valuable and healthy foods like apples, squash, tomatoes, cherries and other top crops, worth an estimated \$439 million annually;

WHEREAS, the United States Environmental Protection Agency and other independent research have found that neonics can harm human health, and the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention have found that half of Americans are regularly exposed to neonics; WHEREAS, Federal and State water testing has detected neonics in waters across New York State, with 30% of Long Island groundwater samples containing a neonic;

WHEREAS, a recent Cornell University review of over 1,100 peer reviewed papers on neonics and cost-benefit analysis of neonics against their likely alternatives ("Cornell Report") concluded that neonic-treatments on corn, soybean, and wheat seeds—which account for roughly three-quarters of all neonic use in New York agriculture—produce "no overall net-income benefit" to farmers using them;

WHEREAS, the Cornell Report also found that non-agricultural, turf and ornamental neonic uses—with the exception of certain treatments for invasive species—were similarly unneeded or replaceable with safer, effective alternatives;

WHEREAS, the bill would: (1) prohibit sale and use of neonic-treated corn, soybean, and wheat seeds effective January 1, 2024; (2) prohibit non-agricultural uses of neonics on turf and ornamental plants, effective January 1, 2023; and (3) require the New York Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) to consider designating other neonic uses as a "restricted use pesticide" in order to protect bee and bird populations; and (4) require DEC, in collaboration with the Department of Agriculture and Markets at Cornell University, to study alternatives to neonics;

WHEREAS, a "restricted use pesticide" is a pesticide that can be purchased, possessed, or used only by a person with a commercial or purchase permit issued by DEC, and that may be subject to other restrictions on its use as determined by DEC;

WHEREAS, the bill allows DEC to permit use of neonics to combat invasive species, including but not limited to emerald ash-borer and hemlock woody adelgid; and

WHEREAS, the *Birds and Bees Protection Act* addresses a serious threat to pollinators and ecosystems and safeguards the future of New York's food system by banning high risk, low-to-no benefit uses of neonics.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Village of Ardsley

- 1. Does hereby support S699B/A7429, banning neonic-treated corn, soybean, and wheat and most outdoor, non-agricultural uses of neonics; and
- 2. Will provide a copy of this resolution to our local New York Assembly and Senate representatives, Hon. MaryJane Shimsky and Hon. Andrea Stewart-Cousins.

6.6 Consider a Resolution to Amend the Adjustment Procedures for Unpaid Water Rents and Penalties

Moved by Trustee Bencosme, Seconded by Trustee Weitz and passed unanimously.

WHEREAS, the Village Board of the Village of Ardsley established a policy and procedures for the sewer rent program and for sewer users to appeal their bill on May 4, 2020; and

WHEREAS, updated procedures are critical to effective Village operations; and

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NOW THEREFORE BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, the Board of Trustees hereby amends the following process and procedures forSewer rent and adjustments or changes to sewer bills: *New text is in <u>bold underline</u> and deleted text is in <u>highlighted strikethrough</u>*

- 1. Sewer users shall pay an amount based on actual water consumption as determined by the water source using a water meter or other measuring device, or an estimated amount if the water source is unable to obtain a reading.
- 2. Ardsley will be using a third-party billing company to administer the billing for sewer rents. Such billing shall be done in a manor prescribed by the contract with the third-party billing company.
- 3. Sewer bills shall be billed on a quarterly basis.
- 4. Sewer payments shall be paid to the Village Ardsley or pursuant to the protocols in the third-party billing contract. Sewer bills will be sent to the address real estate bills would be sent. The failure of a system owner to receive a bill shall not excuse nonpayment thereof, nor shall it act as a waiver of a penalty imposed herein prescribed.
- 5. A sewer user that intends to convey property shall notify the Village or entity to which billing authority has been delegated sufficiently in advance of the closing title for a final sewer rent bill and provide new ownership information.
- 6. System users may be afforded the option of receiving e-bills or direct deposit of payments subject to the terms contained in the contract with the third-party billing company.
- 7. Any adjustments granted, issued or agreed upon with regard to actual water consumption shall be indicated to sewer users and reflected in the next succeeding bill.
- 8. All bills shall become due and payable without penalty within 25 days of issuance.
- 9. A penalty of Five dollars (\$5.00) will be charged for any bill under Fifty dollars (\$50.00) that remains unpaid after 25 days. A 10% penalty will be charged for any bill over Fifty Dollars (\$50.00) that remains unpaid after 30 days. An additional penalty of 1% shall be added to any bill in each succeeding month or any portion of a month in which the sewer rent continues to remain unpaid.
- 10. The Board of Trustees acknowledges that it may bring and maintain an action as upon contract for sewer rents in arrears, including penalties and interest or to foreclose liens for such sewer rents. The Board shall annually cause a statement to be prepared setting forth the amount of each lien for sewer rents in arrears including any administrative costs of processing the lien, the real property affected thereby and the name of the person in whose name such real property is assessed. Such statement shall be presented to the Board of Trustees on or before May 1 of each yearin advance of the printing of Village Tax bills. The Board shall levy the amounts contained in such statement against the real property liable at the same time and in the same manner as village taxes and such amounts shall be caused to be set forth in separate column in the annual tax rolls. The amounts so levied shall be so collected

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and enforced in the same manner and at the same time as may be provided by law for the collection and enforcement of village taxes.

- 11. Ardsley sewer users for properties located outside the territorial limits of the Village of Ardsley are liable for charges in accordance with this resolution unless the subject of an existing agreement with the Village.
- 12. The property of the Village of Ardsley is solely exempt from the obligation to pay sewer rent.
- 13. Adjustments; a sewer user who maintains that the sewer rent should be adjusted for any given quarterly period may make one application to the Village Manager for an adjustment for that period's sewer rent. Such application shall be in writing, and be supported by substantial evidence establishing that the amount of the system user's water consumption that actually was discharged into the sanitary system was less than the amount of water consumption used to calculate the system user's sewer rent. Proof shall be in the following form:
- A. An engineering report from a professional engineer licensed in the State of New York;
- B. Data from a submeter whose operation has been inspected by the Village of Ardsley;
- C. Affidavits; or
- D. Any other documentary evidence.

The system user has the burden of proof. The quantum and quality of proof is necessarily dependent on the amount of the adjustment sought. If any adjustment is warranted, the system user shall receive the same in the form of a credit on the next bill following the Village Manager's determination. If a system user is aggrieved by said determination, said user may appeal to the Board of Trustees within 15 days of same.

7. CORRESPONDENCE

7.1 Received the following email regarding the amendment to "Ethics Code" from Ms. Lorraine Kuhn Ardsley resident:

This is my opinion as an Ardsley resident about the code amendment: The new code says that honorably serving elected officials and honorably serving employees cannot be trusted to be District Leaders.

In fact, the new code will result in the removal of honorably serving elected officials and honorably serving employees for no cause whatsoever.

But the public perception will be that wrongdoing was committed.

You will have unjustly created mistrust.

You will have done nothing to create openness or fairness or advancement of the democratic process.

The new code is completely counterintuitive to these goals.

It actually sows mistrust.

The new code, as a preventative measure going forward, similarly implies that elected officials and employees are more culpable than anyone else.

This is a notion that also promotes mistrust, another counterintuitive problem.

As to the language of the new code, the term "compensated by the Village" is faulty. Will a contractor doing work for the Village, a plumber, carpenter, electrician,

computer consultant, program teacher for example, who is also an Ardsley resident, be barred from being a District Leader?

The idea that someone who is honorably serving the Village as an elected official or working for the good of the Village in any capacity, the idea that we should assume without cause that this person has dishonorable judgement, this idea should not be enacted as Village Code.

Received the following email from Ardsley resident, Gary Rappaport on May 4th, 2023:

Dear Mayor Kaboolian and Trustees DiJusto, Edelstein, and Bencosme:

I feel betrayed by your actions and inactions in allowing personal attacks to be made against me — a citizen of Ardsley for over two decades. Instead of stopping this slander, you should have explained to the speaker that I am not a Village official and that his complaint involves a personal situation over which you have no authority. Instead, you quickly concluded the speaker's accusations were "serious" and needed an immediate investigation! What grave matter, relating to the conduct of Ardsley's government, did he raise? None in the least.

You were informed in my April 24th email that an issue arose about The Orange's use of a dumpster and possible damage to village property in my neighborhood. It would have been preferable if you had questioned the speaker about that before you allowed him to impugn me. When did it become the function of the Village of Ardsley to investigate the complaints of employees of private corporations that do not involve matters relating to the Village's operation? Is the Ardsley Village Board now sitting as a star chamber? What precisely do you plan to have the Village Manager investigate? Your giving credence to unsupported charges without restraint was an egregious "rush to judgment."

In my twenty years of watching Board meetings, I have never witnessed anything worse than last Monday night. You disregarded both the letter and the spirit of your oaths to defend the ideals and values that guide our democratic system. You jumped to conclusions, believing what was claimed to be real. No citizen deserves to be as ill-treated as I was. Many local residents have expressed to me their shock at the character assassination you enabled.

This entire charade was a transparent, scripted, and possibly unconstitutional effort to pressure the Ardsley Historical Society. *You ought to have spoken out against this flagrant misuse of power, but you chose to keep silent.*

A tragedy occurred Monday night in the Village of Ardsley, especially one that depends on volunteers. However, it is never too late to make amends for failing to stop the public ambushing you facilitated in a forum where the matter neither belonged nor fell within the purview of a local municipal government. An appropriate first step would be to express regret for what happened, reiterate that the Village of Ardsley will not investigate this situation, and amending your rules regarding public comment (which is a privilege) to prohibit personal attacks. Residents of Ardsley, and indeed everyone, should be aware that their elected leaders will not accept the slander of private citizens, as happened to me Monday night in the Village where my family and I have resided for 22 years.

Received the following email from Ardsley resident, Gary Rappaport on May 12th, 2023:

Dear Mayor and Trustees of Ardsley,

Almost weeks have passed without a single Ardsley Village Board member replying to my letter concerning Mr. Weitz's employee (David Tahay) defaming me. I am not an official, employee, or representative of the Village of Ardsley. Yet you sat there reprehensibly pretending I was in enabling an employee of a private company to slander me over a matter which has nothing to do with the running of the Village of Ardsley. As I previously stated, that was a low moment in the history of a village I have chronicled. Your continued silence adds to the shame of that night. You knew in advance of the Board meeting about the claimed misuse of a dumpster by The Orange and the property damage they caused. Instead of addressing that with the employee (or Mr. Weitz), you turned public comment (a privilege and not a license) into a star chamber by telling the Village Manager to investigate a private citizen. You failed me and, quite honestly, every Ardsley resident. You set a dangerous precedent by not ending this charade when it became obvious it was outside your jurisdiction.

What puzzled me was your willingness to do Mr. Weitz's bidding. You attend meetings and activities every month.

He never does. He does not provide Committee or Board reports. He never attended a meeting or program while serving as the Historical Society's liaison. After re-listening to the meeting, I learned he outrageously intends to have his employee call the Historical Society's business sponsors and urge them to discontinue sponsoring one of Ardsley's oldest volunteer organizations! In my opinion and the opinion of many citizens, Mr. Weitz should be requested to resign from the Village Board. It would be no loss. While his conduct in seeking to pressure you and others may or may not violate Section 18-4 of the Village's Code of Ethics, in my view, it is unseemly.

I reiterate that every allegation made by Mr. Weitz's employee that night was a scurrilous and unequivocal falsehood. The claims made by Mr. Tahay were total fabrications intended to divert attention from his questionable actions, which you disregarded. In fact, what he told you was improbable - who walks up to someone and asks about their immigration status? This contention was a lie. It never happened. Yet, you gave this absurd allegation credence at my expense and allowed an employee of a private contractor to attack my character and jeopardize my livelihood. Indulging this calumny was a gross dereliction of your obligations under the Village Law, which mandate you look out for the well-being of inhabitants of Ardsley such as myself.

I fully regret my past support of you and will not vote for any of you in the future. In the interim, I recommend you borrow a book from the library titled "Profiles In Courage." You had none on May 1, and sadly that remains true. Finally, Mr. Tahay's comments should be stricken from the minutes as his statements were not only made in an improper forum and for a nefarious purpose, they were likely scripted by "Trustee" Weitz.

I await your reply regarding the minutes and I trust at the next Village Board meeting or any future meeting there will be no repeat of what happened on May 1. Gary S. Rappaport Ardsley NY

Ardsley resident Eda Kapsis stated that she is very appreciative of the action to vote on the resolution regarding the "Ethics Code". Also added that it is really shocking not to have any sources to support Ms. Sullivan's data.

The application shall be certified by the Chief of the volunteer fire company or fire department or the Captain of the voluntary ambulance service as the case may be.

WHEREAS, by resolution the Mayor and Village Board of Trustees authorized the purchase of a Marauder Fire Pumper Model TB-70-CA from Seagrave Fire Apparatus LLC on September 20, 2021 in the amount of \$769,263.00; and

WHEREAS, the Chief of the Department had determined that changes to the original specifications were necessary and in the best interest of the Village and on January 20, 2022, the Village Board authorized the Village Manager to enter into a supplemental contract with Seagrave Fire Apparatus LLC in the amount of \$64,952.00 with supplemental funding to be transferred from Unassigned Fund Balance; and

WHEREAS, on June 21, 2022, the Mayor and Village Board of Trustees authorized the issuance of additional \$30,000 bonds to fund additional changes to the original specification that Chief of the Department had determined were necessary and in the best interest of the Village; and

A RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING, SUBJECT TO PERMISSIVE REFERENDUM, THE ISSUANCE OF AN ADDITIONAL \$100,000 BONDS OF THE VILLAGE OF ARDSLEY, WESTCHESTER COUNTY, NEW YORK, TO PAY PART OF THE COST OF THE PURCHASE OF A PUMPER FIRE-FIGHTING VEHICLE AND RELATED APPARATUS, FOR SAID VILLAGE.

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees of the Village of Ardsley, Westchester County, New York, on May 17, 2021, duly adopted a bond resolution authorizing the issuance of \$805,800 bonds of said Village to pay the cost of the purchase of a pumper fire-fighting vehicle, including incidental expenses in connection therewith, for said Village of Ardsley, Westchester County, New York; and

WHEREAS, said Board of Trustees on June 21, 2022, duly adopted a bond resolution authorizing the issuance of an additional \$30,000 bonds of said Village to pay the cost of apparatus for the aforesaid vehicle; and

WHEREAS, said capital project, as proposed, has been determined to be a Type II Action pursuant to the regulations of the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation promulgated pursuant to the State Environmental Quality Review Act, which it was determined will not have any significant adverse effect on the environment; and

WHEREAS, it has now been determined that the maximum estimated cost of such specific object or purpose to be financed is \$935,800, an increase of \$100,000 over that previously authorized; and

WHEREAS, it is now desired to authorize the issuance of an additional \$100,000 bonds of said Village for such specific object or purpose to pay a portion of the cost thereof;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the affirmative vote of not less than two-thirds of the total voting strength of the Board of Trustees of the Village of Ardsley, Westchester County, New York, as follows:

<u>Section 1.</u> For the specific object or purpose of paying additional costs of the purchase of a pumper fire-fighting vehicle, including incidental apparatus, equipment and expenses in connection therewith, there are hereby authorized to be issued an additional not to exceed \$100,000 bonds of the Village of Ardsley, Westchester County, New York, pursuant to the provisions of the Local Finance Law.

<u>Section 2.</u> It is hereby determined that the maximum estimated cost of such specific object or purpose to be financed is now determined to be \$935,800, which specific object or purpose is hereby authorized at said maximum estimated cost, and that the plan for the financing thereof is as follows:

- a) by the issuance of the \$805,800 bonds of said Village authorized to be issued pursuant to bond resolution dated and duly adopted May 17, 2021;
- b) by the issuance of the \$30,000 bonds of said Village authorized to be issued pursuant to bond resolution dated and duly adopted June 21, 2022; and
- by the issuance of the additional \$100,000 bonds of said
 Village authorized to be issued pursuant to this bond
 resolution.

<u>Section 3.</u> It is hereby determined that the period of probable usefulness of the aforesaid specific object or purpose is twenty years,

pursuant to subdivision 27 of paragraph a of Section 11.00 of the Local Finance Law, calculated from the date of issuance of the first obligations therefor. It is hereby further determined that the period of probable usefulness for the financing of the additional apparatus authorized by bond resolution dated June 21, 2022 is hereby increased to twenty years pursuant to said subdivision and said bond resolution is hereby amended.

Section 4. The faith and credit of said Village of Ardsley, Westchester County, New York, are hereby irrevocably pledged to the payment of the principal of and interest on such obligations as the same respectively become due and payable. An annual appropriation shall be made in each year sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on such obligations becoming due and payable in such year. To the extent not paid from other sources, there shall annually be levied on all the taxable real property in said Village a tax sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on such obligations as the same become due and payable.

<u>Section 5.</u> Subject to the provisions of the Local Finance Law, the power to authorize the issuance of and to sell bond anticipation notes in anticipation of the issuance and sale of the serial bonds herein authorized, including renewals of such notes, is hereby delegated to the Village Treasurer. Such notes shall be of such terms, form and contents, and shall be sold in such manner, as may be prescribed by said Village Treasurer, consistent with the provisions of the Local Finance Law.

<u>Section 6.</u> The powers and duties of advertising such bonds for sale, conducting the sale and awarding the bonds, are hereby delegated to the Village Treasurer, who shall advertise such bonds for sale, conduct the sale, and award the bonds in such manner as the Village Treasurer shall deem best for the interests of said Village, provided, however,

that in the exercise of these delegated powers, the Village Treasurer shall comply fully with the provisions of the Local Finance Law and any order or rule of the State Comptroller applicable to the sale of municipal bonds. The receipt of the Village Treasurer shall be a full acquittance to the purchaser of such bonds, who shall not be obliged to see to the application of the purchase money.

<u>Section 7.</u> All other matters except as provided herein relating to the serial bonds herein authorized including the date, denominations, maturities and interest payment dates, within the limitations prescribed herein and the manner of execution of the same, including the consolidation with other issues, and also the ability to issue serial bonds with substantially level or declining annual debt service, shall be determined by the Village Treasurer, the chief fiscal officer of such Village. Such bonds shall contain substantially the recital of validity clause provided for in Section 52.00 of the Local Finance Law, and shall otherwise be in such form and contain such recitals, in addition to those required by Section 51.00 of the Local Finance Law, as the Village Treasurer shall determine consistent with the provisions of the Local Finance Law.

<u>Section 8.</u> The validity of such bonds and bond anticipation notes may be contested only if:

- 1) Such obligations are authorized for an object or purpose for which said Village is not authorized to expend money, or
- 2) The provisions of law which should be complied with at the date of publication of this resolution are not substantially complied with,

and an action, suit or proceeding contesting such validity is commenced within twenty days after the date of such publication, or

3) Such obligations are authorized in violation of the provisions of the Constitution.

<u>Section 9.</u> This resolution shall constitute a statement of official intent for purposes of Treasury Regulations Section 1.150 - 2. Other than as specified in this resolution, no monies are, or are reasonably expected to be, reserved, allocated on a long-term basis, or otherwise set aside with respect to the permanent funding of the object or purpose described herein.

<u>Section 10.</u>Upon this resolution taking effect, a summary thereof shall be published in the official newspaper, together with a notice of the Village Clerk in substantially the form provided in Section 81.00 of the Local Finance Law.

Section 11. This resolution is adopted subject to permissive referendum.
