Millie reached out to the Ardsley CAC given the following. In preparation we'll inquire on what's useful for Ardsley given her inquiry to make for a meaningful April discussion.

Here's more background and the inquiry below.

Phase I of Planting Westchester has been completed. The initiative encourages and empowers Westchester residents, municipalities, schools and businesses and other organizations to help promote Climate Solutions, Restoration of Natural Systems and Local Food Security through growing and maintaining healthy trees and/or other plants. Underlying the project are core principals of inclusive, socially-equitable decision making, community participation, communication, and relationship-building, and the value of healthy natural systems including biodiversity not only environmental and climate resilience but also to human health and well-being.

Phase II is beginning during which the team will reach out to a few key municipal environmental groups to help develop a baseline of needs across the County by discussing ways in which the County can support CACs (or similar types of groups) and the municipalities in which they are located.
